STRIKE MAY BE AVERTED

Plan Is Proposed by J. R. Bowles, Pending President's Conference on Labor. If workmen in Portland's steel shipyards are willing to continue work on government vessels at the old wage scale, and have the difference between that pay and the new scale agreed upon for October 1 set aside as a fund to be turned over to them whenever the shipping board authorizes the increase of 8 cents an hour, a strike of 10,000 or more men in the shipyards can be averted. Otherwise, work on government vessels in the Portland yards will stop at midnight tonight.
