

REED HOLDS TREATY IS 'LEAGUE OF WAR'

Missouri Senator Denies Pact Benefits United States.

WILSON REMARK TARGET

Programme of "Sacrifice" Branded as Burden Which Proponents Will Not Share in Bearing.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 30.—Quoting from pre-war and later speeches of President Wilson, Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, speaking before the league of nations, said the president had reversed his own opinions in order to support the league proposal.

"The American people generally have been led to believe that the league is formed for our benefit, and that its purpose is to keep America out of war," said Senator Reed. "As a matter of fact, the league is formed for the benefit of other nations and is to be maintained largely at the expense of the American people."

The president has "convinced himself that it is the business of American statesmen to sacrifice America on the altar of humanity," he asserted.

Referring to Mr. Wilson's remark at Reno during his recent tour, that he wanted to get into any kind of trouble that will help liberate mankind and did not want to be always thinking about my "skin or my pocketbook or my friendships," the senator said:

"President's Skin Not Involved.—The trouble is that it is not the president's skin that is to be sacrificed. It is the skin on the backs of the American people. It is not the president's pocketbook that is to be emptied. It is the pocketbooks of 110,000,000 Americans."

"I deny the right of any temporary officeholder to so employ the powers of his office as to compel your sons to sacrifice their lives in the contests of other nations. I deny the right of any temporary officeholder to lay burdens upon American taxpayers to control alien peoples who spend their money and hate us for interference in their affairs. Bear in mind the men who propose to impose these great obligations of sacrifice are not the ones who bear the burdens."

Wilson's Trip Criticized.—"Let me give you a little sample of the kind of sacrifices that are made by officeholders. The president went over to Paris. He took 1300 men over with him. A glass pavilion was built on a great ship beneath which the president promenade. He asked congress for \$5,000,000 to pay the expenses of this trip. Congress refused but the expenses proceeded. They rented an engine hotel for the modest sum of \$235,000. They paid a laundry bill of \$21,532 and yet did not wash all the dirty linen."

Calling a programme for an army of 600,000, which he said the administration had planned to meet obligations under the league of nations, he said it showed the purpose of the league.

"The truth is we are making a league of war," he declared. "We propose to unite with five great nations to control the affairs of the world. This requires armies and navies of tremendous magnitude, but the people of this country will never submit to the dictation. What does the United States gain for this? She does not seek territory; she does not seek lands. All of her principal associates in the league are grabbing lands and people in every quarter of the globe. We propose to pour our dollars into their coffers and to pour the blood of our sons upon the altar of their ambitions. This is what the president is pleased to call sacrifice."

ROLPH TO GREET JOHNSON

BIG WELCOME PLANNED IN SAN FRANCISCO FOR SOLO.

Anti-League Speeches Scheduled for Men and Women, Prior to Los Angeles Visit.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.—When United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson arrives in San Francisco this evening to begin his third stumping campaign against the league of nations covenant and the peace treaty in their present form, he will be greeted by Mayor James Rolph and a large welcoming committee. A platform has been erected at the Union Ferry building where Senator Johnson will be given an official welcome to San Francisco.

Senator Johnson's first public address was scheduled to take place tomorrow before a meeting of men in the Palace hotel. His principal address while here will be in the Coliseum tomorrow night. Thursday he will address a meeting of women in the Palace hotel, and Thursday night will depart for Los Angeles.

REBELS HARSHLY TREATED

Carranza Deals Vigorously With New Revolutionists.

LAREDO, Tex., Sept. 30.—Information was received today from San Luis Potosi, capital of the Mexican state of that name, that General Barragan had failed to capture Rafael Nieto, who is charged with instigating a new revolution against the Carranza government. General Barragan, however, captured members of the Nietoist "legislature" and it is declared these captives were "badly treated" upon their arrival at San Luis Potosi.

Governor Martinez is "treating the Nietistas with great vigor," it is said, and San Luis Potosi "presents the aspect of a city under siege."

Can Judge Rossman Resist Appeal Like This?

SOCIALISTS BACK BERGER

Effort to Unseat Held Blow at Representative Government.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—The resignation of Adolph Germer as national secretary was accepted at a meeting here yesterday of the executive committee of the American socialist party, at which also was adopted a resolution characterizing the effort to unseat Victor Berger as representative from Wisconsin as a blow at "representative government."

Otto Bannister, Chicago, was chosen to succeed Germer. Under instructions from the recent national convention a committee consisting of Morris Hillquit, James O'Neal, Victor Berger, H. A. Hoehn and Joseph E. Cohen was named to prepare a declaration of principles to be the working programme for 1920.

The name of the party's official organ was changed from the "Eye Opener" to the "Socialist's Call." The month commencing November 15 was set aside for a campaign of agitation for the freeing from prison of Eugene V. Debs, Kate Richards O'Hare and "all other class war prisoners."

BIG CORPORATION FORMED

Luedinghaus Lumber Company Capitalized at Million.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—The Luedinghaus Lumber Company today filed articles of incorporation with the Lewis county auditor, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. Dryad, Wash., is named as the principal place of business. G. M. Duncan, one of Portland's best known lumber men, is associated with George J. Marsh, of Ostrander, Wash., and W. F. Downs of Meekill, as incorporators. George and Frank Luedinghaus are pioneer Lewis county millmen and it is understood that the deal under way contemplates their retirement after more than 20 years spent in the business in Lewis county. Their Dryad plant is modern and a great belt of timber back of it insures a steady run for many years, the timber being some of the best in the northwest.

MEDICAL LAW EXPLAINED

Attorney-General Brown Interprets Oregon Requirements.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Replying to a letter received from Dr. Frank W. Wood, of Portland, secretary of the board of medical examiners, Attorney-General Brown holds that the only diploma requirement for the admission of a physician to practice medicine in Oregon is that the medical college from which the diploma is issued shall be one which requires four terms of instruction of eight months each.

Dr. Wood also is informed in the opinion that the medical board has no authority to change the application fees which are fixed by statute. The law, as interpreted by Mr. Brown, applies to the admittance of physicians from other states into Oregon.

EXTENSION CLASSES IN PORTLAND TO BE DIRECTED.

Instructor of Journalism Will Be Executive Secretary Here for Oregon University.

The former dean of the school of journalism of the University of Washington will be added to the staff of the Portland extension center, University of Oregon, this morning when C. V. Dymont reports for duty as executive secretary.

Mr. Dymont, who was from 1904 to 1913 a Portland newspaper man and who became professor of journalism at the University of Oregon in 1913, was chosen head of journalism at Washington in 1917. Upon his return from France this spring, he resigned at Washington to go into the fast expanding Portland work of the University of Oregon. He will be in Eugene Mondays and Tuesdays to teach courses in journalism, but on the remaining five days of each week will be in Portland with offices at 632 courthouse building.

The Portland work of the university has grown so greatly in the last two years that a man was needed to co-ordinate it and to handle executive details. For this, Mr. Dymont was chosen.

CORN JUDGED IN FIELD

County Agent Visits Contestants for Roseburg Event.

ROSEBURG, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—In anticipation of the prospective corn show to be held in Roseburg October 24-25, many farmers entered the one-acre field contest at the planting season and today C. J. Hurd, county agent, accompanied by H. A. Scotch, of the O. A. C., began a tour of the county for the purpose of judging the standing corn.

Judging was deemed necessary at this time in order that the crops might be harvested. The standing corn will be scored on a basis of 50 points for field, 40 points for bushel of corn from field, 10 points in production profit, the latter to be fixed by signed statement from the contestant giving the total cost of crop and yield. The first 50 points will be awarded as the field is judged, the remaining to be determined at the corn show.
