CENSUS OPERATORS NEEDED.—Although only ten days are left to apply for positions as operators in taking the 14th census of the United States, the system is yet in need of perfecting. Supervisors of the three leading districts of Oregon report a lack of information from Washington, D. C. Both men and women are eligible for the positions. The pay will range from 2 to 4 cents a name, according to the district in which they will work. One month only, the month of January, will be necessary for the work. Applicants must apply for the district in which they live and their applications must be in before October 15. H. R. Crawford, Salem, is supervisor of the first district; W. A. Ferrall, Wasco, of the second; and W. D. Bennett, 404-409 Fenton building, Portland, is supervisor of the third district.

FIRE PREVENTION DAY NEAR.—Next Thursday, October 9, will be fire prevention day throughout the United States. Last year the loss by fire in this country was more than \$2,000,000, with a toll of more than 15,000 lives, according to statements by the fire prevention bureau of the insurance companies. Most of the fires were due to carelessness and were classified as preventable waste. The loss to the railroads from fire losses last year was more than \$10,000,000, and under order of the officials of the administration the day will be devoted by railroad employees to putting property in order with respect to fire hazards.

RUMMAGE SALE TOMORROW.—The Portland Woman's Research club, assisted by college societies, will give a rummage sale beginning tomorrow, October 7, and continuing through the week, at the Unitarian church, Broadway and Yamhill streets. Donations are requested. Proceeds will go to the woman's building fund of the University of Oregon.

PIONEER DIES AT FOSSIL.
MRS. MARY C. HAMILTON SUC-CUMBS TO LONG ILLNESS.
 Native of Iowa Is Resident of Oregon 66 Years; Three Children Survive.

FOSSIL, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mary C. Hamilton, for more than 66 years a resident of Oregon, died at her home in Fossil September 28 after an illness of several months. She was almost 77 years of age and leaves to mourn her loss two sons and one daughter, Ralph and Wayne Hamilton and Mrs. Anna Prindle, all of Fossil; seven grandchildren and six sisters and brothers: W. H. Byars of Salem, Austin Mires of Ellensburg, Wash.; Benton Mires of Drain, Mrs. Anna Bonham of Tyler, Wash.; Mrs. Addie Cole of Spokane, Wash.; and John S. Mires of Republic, Wash. Her husband, David Hamilton, to whom she was married on May 28, 1853, died July 18, 1908. Mrs. Hamilton was a sturdy type of the Oregon pioneer. She was born October 3, 1842, near Burlington, Des Moines county, Iowa. When but a girl of 10 years she accompanied her parents to Oregon, spending the first winter near Milwaukie, but later taking up a permanent residence near the town of Oakland in the Umpqua valley. After her marriage she continued to reside in Douglas county until 1870, when she moved with her husband and family to where the town of Fossil is now located and where she continued to make her home.

CIVIL SERVICE JOBS OPEN.—A list just issued by the United States civil service commission gives positions under the civil service for which applications can be made through examinations in the near future. SUBMARINE LEAVES TODAY.—At 6 o'clock this morning the U-88, captured German submarine, and its mother ship, the United States steamship Bittern, will leave the municipal boat landing bound for Astoria, where a few minutes' stop will be made to land passengers. The vessel will then go direct to Seattle, where port they are expected to reach Tuesday night. Hundreds of persons were disappointed last night because they were unable to get aboard the under-sea craft. While the submarine was in Portland it remained open until 3 P. M., an hour after the scheduled closing time, so that as many as possible could go through it. It is estimated that 10,000 visitors visited the U-boat yesterday.

STRAIN HORSE SHOW MANAGER.—T. T. Strain, who for several months has been a member of the War Camp Community Service reception committee, has been appointed manager of the night horse show at the Pacific International Livestock exposition and expects soon to go to California and British Columbia in the interest of the exhibition. \$1,000,000 PAID IN DAY

TAX DELINQUENCY OF MULTNOMAH, ESTIMATED, \$2,500,000.

All Payments in Mail by Sunday Midnight Will Be Accepted by Department Today.

When the mail is opened today, it will be found that tax payments amounting to fully a million dollars were made yesterday by Multnomah county taxpayers, in the opinion of officials in the tax collecting department.

Yesterday was the last day on which payments could be made without a penalty attached.

Although Saturday's mail is still uncounted and anything like accurate figures cannot be obtained, it is estimated by Chief Deputy Tax Collector Hucksby that collections were still short of the levy by \$2,500,000 Saturday night.

Payments from the Portland Railway Light & Power company and some other large corporations had not been received Saturday and it is expected that they will be included in the mail to be opened today.

All night payments postmarked before midnight Sunday night will be accepted without the penalty.

Taxes not paid yesterday will draw interest at the rate of 1 per cent a month or 12 per cent a year and on November 5 a flat penalty of 5 per cent of the face value of the tax will be attached.

PLANT TO BE CHANGED

Columbia City Ship Concern to Be Furniture Factory.

ST. HELENS, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The plant of the International Ship-building company at Columbia City will be used for purposes other than building ships, for the owners of the plant have decided to convert it into a furniture factory. George McBride of Portland, who was the head of the old concern, said that all of the necessary machinery for a furniture factory has been obtained and is ready for delivery. Workmen are making the necessary changes to convert the plant from a shipbuilding plant into a furniture factory and within 90 days it is expected that the factory will be in operation. The new concern is incorporated with capital of \$75,000, and its home office is to be in Portland. The company owns valuable water frontage at Columbia City and a dock and it is intended to ship products by rail and water.

WATER PERMITS FILED

6000-Acre Project Near Enterprise to Cost \$100,000.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Applications for permits to appropriate water have been filed in the office of State Engineer Capper by Charles Montgomery of Prineville, covering the appropriation of water from Crooked River for the irrigation of 151 acres of land. This development will cost approximately \$100,000. An application also has been filed by Charles Hutchinson of North Powder for the construction of a reservoir for the storage of 10,000 acre feet of the waters of Wolf creek, and by Leslie R. Henry of Langlois, Curry county.
