

### POINDEXTER DRIVES SHAFT AT HITCHCOCK

#### Chamber Electrified by Clash of Two Senators.

### PRO-GERMANISM CHARGED

#### Washington Lawmaker Recalls Resolution of Nebraskan Against Sending Munitions to Allies.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 7.—There is always a certain type of men who safely place themselves on the outskirts while a fight is going on, to observe, apparently, and after it is over, immediately take the center of the stage and become exceedingly belligerent.

This shaft aimed at Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, democratic floor leader, by Senator PoinDEXTER this afternoon electrified the atmosphere of the senate for a few minutes while the two senators glared at each other and exchanged passes on the subject of pro-Germanism.

The clash came when Senator Hitchcock, replying to a reflection by Senator PoinDEXTER on the source of the funds used to promote the league of nations fight, charged that the opposition to the league is led by the pro-German socialists, anarchists and bolsheviks of the country. This Senator PoinDEXTER to his feet with a leap and there was a flutter in the galleries as the Washington senator leveled a shot at a vulnerable spot in the Nebraskan's pre-war record.

Retaliating PoinDEXTER charged. "It seems to be quite a bold attitude for a senator to take who, while the fighting was good between the allies and Germany, was doing what he could to retard it instead of forwarding it, at least up to the point where the United States declared war; who on various occasions introduced bills and resolutions in congress for the purpose of arming the efforts of our allies in their war with Germany and to cut off supplies of munitions that were necessary to carry on the war; who declared on various occasions in congress that he was pathos with the Germans and on other occasions that he was neutral in this war; who was not conspicuous at any time, even after the war was over, in this great campaign that he speaks of, which was carried on for the purpose of waging it to a victorious conclusion. He only becomes prominent in his anti-Germanism and his denunciation of pro-Germanism after the fight is over, after the victory has been won."

Old Embargo Recalled. PoinDEXTER's remarks had reference to a resolution introduced in the senate by Hitchcock before the United States entered the war, which placed an embargo on the shipment of ammunition and food supplies to the countries at war with Germany. He made reference to this resolution on the floor by Senator PoinDEXTER a few weeks ago in a debate with Senator Hitchcock, a used a Vice President Marshall to intervene in the Nebraskan's behalf. Today Senator Hitchcock became so indignant that the presiding officer showed no inclination to prevent reply in kind.

The tension of other senators and the galleries was relaxed when Senator Penrose facetiously inquired if the senator from Nebraska also placed the friends of Irish freedom in the proscribed class.

### ITALY'S KING SIGNS TREATIES OF PEACE

#### War With Germany and Austria Is Ended.

### PARLIAMENT MUST RATIFY

#### Pact Will Become Effective as Soon as Australian Dominion Attaches Signature.

ROME, Oct. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—King Victor Emmanuel has ratified the German and Austrian treaties by decree. The Giornale d'Italia says that each decree contains two articles, the first authorizing the government to execute the treaty fully, and the second setting forth that the decree be presented to parliament to be converted into law.

Ratification of the German treaty by the royal decree of the King of Italy virtually completes the steps necessary for putting into effect the pact between Germany and the allied powers which was signed at Versailles on June 28, and which stipulated it would become operative when ratified by three of the great powers. The British parliament has already ratified the treaty and the document now awaits only ratification by the last of Great Britain's dominions to act upon it, the Australian commonwealth, before becoming binding upon Great Britain.

### TIGER'S SON IS ACCUSED

#### CHECKS SAID TO HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED FROM LENOIR.

#### Clemenceau's Grandson Is Toils Charged With Fraud in Sale of Autos, Never Delivered.

PARIS, Oct. 6.—(Special.)—Some French newspapers publish a story today which alleges swindling by one of Premier Clemenceau's grandsons, Fred Georges Gaineau. These newspapers also accuse the Tiger's son, Michael Clemenceau, of having received checks from Pierre Lenoir, who was sentenced to death for having sold to the Italian government, in the Calcaux-Humbert affair and who was reprieved at the last moment on September 19.

Gaineau, it is charged, proposed to the owner of a garage near Paris to sell to him 20 American motor cars at \$2000 each, including a commission of Gaineau of \$300 a car. The bargain was struck but Gaineau, it is said, wanted half the amount in advance before ordering the delivery of the cars. Gaineau received \$206,900 in all, it is alleged, but none of the cars were delivered at the garage. The buyer sought out Gaineau, who admitted the cars existed only in his imagination. He offered to repay the money advanced to him, and it is said made out a check, payment of which was refused at the bank. ### BROWNSVILLE EATS BEAR

#### Linn County Bruins Crowd Stockman's Traps.

BROWNSVILLE, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—About seven miles up the Calaveras river from this city, on Brush creek, the Linn county bruins, black, brown and tawny bears—everything but polar bears—are literally falling over themselves in order to get into Edward Lowden's bear-trap.

Lowden is a stockman who formerly lived at Brownville. When he moved to Brush creek he found that each year his ranch was invaded by bears from the Cascade foothills. Every autumn as soon as the berries, fruits and nuts fall, down swoop the hungry creatures to ruin the Lowden apple, berry and little pig crop.

Lowden at first took all this as a matter of course, as something that could not be helped; but this year as the bear came into his place earlier than ever before and hungrier than ever before, due to the lack of huckleberries, the Linn county stockman journeyed to town and invested in a 25-bar-trap.

First he captured a medium-sized brown bear. Then a catamount, wild as they make them, walked into the snare, and next a huge black bruin weighing well over 300 pounds in its stocky feet. Lowden told his bear-steaks into Brownville and had little trouble in selling the meat to the towns-people.
