

FLIER URGES CITY
TO IMPROVE FIELD

"Around the Rim" Aviator
Says Only \$500 Needed.

TRIP TO RESUME TODAY

Lieutenant-Colonel Hartz in Army
Bomber to Go to Eugene and
Thence to Sacramento.

"If the city of Portland will spend \$500 in improving its landing field it will have a field as good as any in the country in many respects," was the assertion of Lieutenant-Colonel Hartz, in command of the army Martin bomber plane, which is in Portland on its "around-the-rim" tour of the United States.

Colonel Hartz is making the transcontinental flight for the sole purpose of impressing upon every locality the absolute need for better landing fields, and he has met with much success in every city he has visited thus far on his aerial tour.

The Martin bomber, with its crew of four, will leave shortly after 6 o'clock this morning for the south. It will make a short stop at Eugene, and then will set out for the long flight to Mather field, near Sacramento, Cal. The bomber will arrive at Mather field some time this afternoon.

Foresters Hear Address.

During the stop in Portland yesterday, Colonel Hartz addressed the meeting of the Western Forestry and Conservation Congress upon the utility of the airplane in patrolling and fighting forest fires.

It was Colonel Hartz, as commanding officer of Bolling field, Washington, D. C., who first conceived the idea of using the army planes for forest patrol work, and before he left the national capital he was assured by United States Senator McNary of Oregon that everything possible would be done to further this work during the coming year.

Big Saving Reported.

Senator McNary was kind enough to tell me that the forest patrol work which was started by army planes in this state late this summer had saved the state more than a million dollars," said Colonel Hartz yesterday. "He believes, with me, that with the use of the bombing plane and chemical bombs to be used in actual aerial forest fire fighting, that the western state can be saved many millions of dollars annually."

The Martin bomber, when it "jumps off" for the south today, will be piloted by Lieutenant Ernest E. Harding. Besides Harding and Lieutenant Colonel Hartz the other members of the plane's crew will be Sergeant "Jerry" Tobias and "Jack" Harding Jr.

MR. HOUSE STARTS HOME

NO REASON IS GIVEN FOR DEPARTURE FROM FRANCE.

Important League Work Completed, but Not Announced—Trip Is at Own Initiative.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—E. M. House completed some most important work in connection with the league of nations before he left for his Sunday night, but little more he said about it at the moment.

Mr. House left Paris quietly, because he feared, were his departure known in Washington, President Wilson would ask him to remain in Europe longer, and he does not wish to do that. He would not give any indication of what his work has been since he left France for England after signing the German treaty. Likewise he gave no reason for his departure from Paris, which was taken at his own initiative, except to say that he wants to go home.

When asked if it were true that he would return to Paris at the president's request, Mr. House said, simply: "I always have been and always will be at the service of the president."

Little attention is paid to reports published here that the league of nations will not meet until next year. There are strong reasons to suppose that the council of the league, not the assembly, will meet this year, probably in Paris. It is expected the treaty will be ratified before the end of this year by a third power, either America, Japan or Italy, thereby making it effective. It becomes essential for the council to meet very soon thereafter to take up the question of the delimitations of the Saar Basin, since this must be done two weeks after the treaty takes effect.

118 Driven From Town After Being Forced to Kiss Flag.

WEIRTON, W. Va., Oct. 7.—One hundred and eighteen alleged members of the I. W. W., captured in a raid near here today, were marched into the public square of Weirton, forced to kiss the American flag and were then driven out of town by police and deputies.

Seven others, suspected of being leaders, after kissing the flag, were taken to the county jail at New Cumberland, where they will be held pending investigation by federal authorities.

The raid was carried out without any serious disorder. Several days ago there appeared on the sidewalks here written threats that the I. W. W. will get you. Last night the meeting place of the men was located in an old barn on the Hancock county road, south of here. It was surrounded by heavily armed deputies.

A search resulted in finding a large quantity of "red" literature, in which the flag of anarchy was extolled and the prediction made that the extremists would rule the world.

BIG PROJECTS FORESEEN

OFFICIAL SAYS OREGON WILL DOUBLE IRRIGATION.

F. S. Bramwell Estimates Million Acres Will Be Put Under Water Within Two Years.

That Oregon will quickly more than double the irrigated area within the borders of the state is the prediction of Frank S. Bramwell, field secretary of the State Chamber of Commerce, who has just returned from a tour of eastern and central counties. It is his estimate that more than 1,000,000 acres will be brought under the flow of water in canals and laterals within the next two years, much of it land that is practically unproductive at present.

Investigation of development enterprise throughout the state is being made in connection with a tour to obtain co-operation of county courts in the plans for a national advertising campaign to attract the best class of farmers to this state.

County commissioners throughout the state are giving their approval to the proposition that each county court make an appropriation of \$1000 for the advertising fund, to be handled under the direction of the state chamber, and which was approved by the state association of commissioners at their meeting here last month.

The state chamber is now giving its assistance to an effort of the communities of Ontario, Burns, Vale, Herford, Unity and the Burnt River valley to establish mail service which will bring remote districts into the outside world.

FLYING MEASURE GOES IN
