Delegates to National Convention Will Receive Instruction on Important Issues.

Summoned by telegraph from every section of Oregon, members of the state executive committee of the American Legion will meet this afternoon at the Hotel Portland, at which time William B. Follett, of Eugene, state chairman, will outline important policies for the coming year and decisions will be made on affairs vital to the successful operation of the state body.

Determination of policies of various posts throughout the state so that the delegates may go to the national convention in Minneapolis in November with the definite knowledge of what the ex-service men of Oregon want but through there, is a matter that will be discussed.

Appointment of numerous committees depends on the desires of the committee meeting today and plans for future operations of the state organization will be taken up.

The meeting is scheduled for 2 o'clock and probably will be held in Mr. Follett's rooms at the hotel.

M'ARTHUR IS RECOVERED Representative Leaves for Capital After Mouth's Illness.

Following a slow recovery from a serious attack of diphtheria, which confined him to his room for ten days and threatened to destroy the sight of his left eye, Representative C. N. McArthur left last night for Washington to resume his congressional duties.

In September for the purpose of accompanying Secretary of the Navy Daniels on his tour of inspection of the Columbia river. He expected to return to the capitol October 1, but developed a bad case of diphtheria that time and has been under the care of a specialist. It was stated yesterday that he will fully recover from the attack.

Mr. McArthur said last evening that he expected early and favorable action by the navy department and congress on the question of establishing a submarine base and aviation station at the mouth of the Columbia river. He has been advised that Secretary Daniels and members of his official party were most favorably impressed with the proposed site at Tongue Point.

In Mr. McArthur's judgment there will be little or no important legislation disposed of by congress until the question of the peace treaty is out of the way. Practically all other questions, he says, will go over until the December session of congress.

Judge Rossmann overruled the demurrer and fined Glickman \$75. Mr. Goldstein announced that appeal would be made immediately and bond for appeal was placed at \$200.

FATHER O'HARA TO SPEAK Industrial Conditions in Europe Columbus Day Subject.

At the Columbus day programme to be held at 8 o'clock tomorrow at Everyman's club, 243 Couch street, under the auspices of the National Catholic War council, Rev. Father E. V. O'Hara will be the principal speaker. He will give a talk on industrial unrest in Europe.

Father O'Hara, recently returned from Europe, where he made a study of industrial conditions. At the instance of the United States bureau of labor, he delivered particularly into labor conditions, and met many of the leading employers and labor leaders on the continent and in England. In his lectures he will draw parallels between European and American conditions.

ALASKA RANGER VISITS FORESTRY DISTRICTS NORTH MUCH LARGER THAN HERE. Vast Stands of Spruce and Hemlock Suitable for Commerce Are Found on Inspection.

Forest inspection trips through the Tongass national forest of Alaska are far different from the same tours in Oregon or Washington reserves, according to A. J. Jaenlecke, forest examiner, who has just returned from the northern woods.

The Tongass, he explains, is in the southeastern part of the peninsula, which is made up largely of small islands, and rangers travel through them on motorboats provided by the government. Each man has from one and a half to four and a half million acres under his supervision, whereas in the states there are two or three rangers to each million acres.

Mr. Jaenlecke spent two months in Alaska examining spruce and hemlock, which had been attacked by an insect. These trees had lost their needles as though a fire had been through the great tracts. Inspection proved that the pest would probably move on each year and would do no great damage, few of the trees being killed by it.
