More Than 100 Board Chamber of Commerce Train.

MEDFORD VISIT ON TODAY

More Thorough Acquaintance With Neighboring Communities Object of Portland Excursion.

More than 100 Portland business men were aboard the special train that left the Portland Union station last night at 7:45 o'clock for the trip to towns of the southern part of the state.

Train Well Equipped.

The special train is one of the best in its appointments that has been provided for a trip of business men, and is the first that has been run from Portland since the introduction of a baggage-dynamo car in charge of J. J. Brady, electrician, a compartment and two drawing-room cars of the type formerly used on the Astoria Limited.

Hamilton Marshall Carlock.

Hamilton Marshall Carlock, president of the H. M. Carlock and Sons Hardware Exchange building, and a resident of Portland for the last 30 years, died early yesterday morning at his home in the city, 315 East Sixteenth street.

He was born in Georgetown, Colo., May 28, 1856. He was a member of the Insurance Federation of Oregon, the Oregon State Motor association, the Credit Men's association of Portland and the Elks lodge.

Mr. Carlock's death came following a coast-to-coast trip with his wife. On the return trip he was attacked with acute indigestion at Spokane. Later his heart was affected.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Mowery Carlock, his daughter, Marjorie Carlock, stepson, Rue Mowery, and stepdaughters, Phyllis Mowery and four brothers, A. B. Carlock and Henry Carlock of Portland, J. W. Carlock of Lodi, Cal., and F. M. Carlock of Bakersfield, Cal.

When the personnel of the party were gathered at the station it became apparent that as a movement for getting acquainted, the excursion scored high in its inception. Business men who have been active in the various avenues of commercial pursuits found in the trip to southern Oregon the chance to become familiar with competitors whom they meet frequently and the expression was heard in varying forms that it is beneficial to the busy man to get away from home for a few days to rest and refresh his mind.

Medford to Eternity.

This morning the special train is due to arrive at the Medford depot at 9 A. M. and the day will be devoted to meeting the business men of the orchard city and in trips into the rich region of the country.
