Teacher Tells of Trials and Successes in Field.

SOME HARD TESTS FACED War Experience Gives Workers Broader Judgment, Greater Tolerance and Understanding.

In relating her experiences in meeting the demands on her scholastic achievements, and the story of the mountain of sandwiches she and her helpers needed to feed a special order for Pershing's troops, some interesting information on various phases of the "Y" woman's canteen work in the field was given recently by an intelligent young school teacher of Pomona, California, Miss Elizabeth A. Wood. In the following interview she gave some observations on the trials and successes of woman's work with the A. E. F.

Some Hard Tests Faced. "Especially since the armistice the programme of the 'Y' has been to create a home atmosphere in the huts. Impossible! Yes, but worth trying for and one in which women could find a big place. More effort has been given to hut decoration and entertainment, but still in the attempt to the spirit of hospitality and friendliness."

Women Acquire Judgment. "We have heard a good deal about the returning soldier and a stranger tried to say what kind of man he is going to be. What's going to be the change in several thousands of women workers who have toiled in France?" I asked.

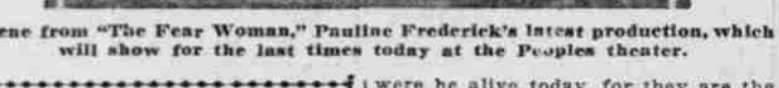
Flash Unexpected One. "We had huge trays of jam, mountains of slices of bread and a growing number of boxes filled with the finished product. It was a grand game. With some shifting of personnel to ease blistered fingers and breaking backs, we worked the rest of the afternoon and evening. At 10 o'clock we estimated we had passed the 6000 mark. Just then a hand-worked second lieutenant, who had shown some in timidity and said: 'Wait a minute folks. Don't work any longer. We have just received a telegram from home. The war is coming tomorrow and the review is indefinitely postponed. What happened to me and the sandwiches the next day is another story.'"
