INTELLIGENCE AGENT HAS 21 MONTHS IN FRANCE.

Bible Used as Antidote to Bolshevik Propaganda Absorbed in Radical Press of Paris.

After 21 months' service in France, engaged during most of that time in intelligence work at Paris and Nantes, Sergeant Claude M. Newlin, former teacher of English in the Lincoln high school, returned to Portland yesterday.

This applies, also, to the office force, bookkeepers and stenographers, and the janitor and the errand boy."
