EVANGELIST SPEAKS ON LABOR—Rev. D. L. Schultz, labor evangelist, will speak in the auditorium of the Y. M. C. A. this noon on "The Influence of Labor on the Church and the Church on Labor." Rev. Mr. Schultz is from Pittsburgh, Pa. He has made long study of labor conditions and is considered an authority on the subject. Tonight, at 8 o'clock, the Oregon Audubon society, will give the first of a series of lectures on "Common Birds of the Portland District." This will be illustrated with motion pictures and slides. These lectures will be given every Thursday night for six weeks, under auspices of the service department.

TWO HUND FORTY BUREAU—Inspector Swensen left yesterday for San Francisco to bring back Guy Lamberson and George Wheeler, under indictment last for alleged involvement in the burglary of several houses. The two men were arrested following the arrest in Portland of Arthur Schindling and Elmer Zimmerman. Inspector Swensen noticed a mud-covered automobile in front of a house one evening. He took the number in the belief that the machine might have been stolen. Later it developed that the car was not stolen and that the suspects were arrested by tracing the automobile.

AUTO THREE GETS YEAR—Joseph Davis, who was arrested in Portland in September, 1917, was sentenced to one year in the county jail by Presiding Judge Gatens yesterday on the recommendation of Deputy District Attorney Hamersley following a plea of guilty from the driving man. Davis was arrested in Texas about a month ago. To try him would necessitate calling witnesses at considerable expense from Utah, without the certainty of conviction and he agreed to plead guilty to simple larceny. He was given the limit.

COURTESY LESSON COSTS \$10—Cubert Fay learned a lesson in courtesy, which cost him \$10 in the municipal court yesterday. When Fay was stopped by Sergeant Oelsner and Patrolman J. F. Forkan, the preceding evening, and warned that his headlights were not burning, he told the officers to go to some place hotter than Portland, it was testified. They subsequently placed him under arrest, and he was fined \$10 for having no headlights. If he had taken the warning in good part and lit his headlights, there would have been no arrest, the officers said.

DRUG POSSESSOR FINED, JAILED—When Ah Wing, Chinese dry goods merchant on North Fourth street, saw an officer approach him, he dropped six small packages of morphine behind him on the ground and continued forward unabashed to meet the guardian of the law, according to the testimony of Patrolman Schumm in municipal court yesterday. Ah Wing was sentenced to 30 days in jail and given a fine of \$250 on a charge of having morphine, November 7 and 8. Bond for appeal was placed at \$1000.

CASE AGAINST AUTOIST DISMISSED—Judge Rosman yesterday, on learning that John Daulton had made a cash settlement with Mrs. M. M. Murphy, 5408 Sixty-sixth street Southeast, for injuries sustained when she was struck by his machine at Second and Morrison streets last Saturday, dismissed the case against Daulton. The charge against Daulton was cutting a corner, but the testimony of witnesses was confusing. They did not agree as to which direction Daulton was going.

WOMEN PLAN BIG DRIVE

MRS. NICHOLSON, STATE CHIEF, OUTLINES PLANS.

Roosevelt's New York Birthplace to Be Americanization Center and Nation's Memorial.

Plans for the campaign of the Women's Roosevelt Memorial association to procure Oregon's apportionment of the fund which the women of the country are to raise for the purchase of the birthplace of Theodore Roosevelt are being outlined by Mrs. T. J. B. (A. W.) Nicholson, state chairman, and it is planned to conduct an active campaign for subscriptions.

Mrs. Nicholson was named state chairman for Oregon at the request of Mrs. Roosevelt and her daughter, Mrs. Richard Derby. The state organization has already designated a number of its other officers and county chairmen, including the following: Mrs. Charles Wood Eberlin of Klamath Falls, whose husband is county chairman of the memorial drive; Mrs. Delroy Getchell of Medford; Mrs. C. H. Horner of Condon; Mrs. Gertrude Talbot of Eugene; Mrs. O. O. Jettley of Burns; Mrs. Colline Elkin of Prineville; Mrs. H. H. Perry of The Dalles, and Mrs. Gertrude Lewthwaite of Clackamas county.

Among the directors for the state of Oregon are Mrs. A. C. Newell, Mrs. James B. Kerr, Mrs. C. B. Simmons and Mrs. Sherman O'Gorman. Mrs. Henry L. Corbett went to New York as representative for the state chairman to attend an important meeting in Carnegie hall.

The Women's memorial association held its first meeting in January in New York, and in accordance with the wishes of the Roosevelt family, decided upon the purchase of the birthplace of Theodore Roosevelt in New York City, to be used as an Americanization center. Mrs. James Roosevelt is one of the vice-presidents of the organization, and among the officers are Mrs. James Roosevelt, Mrs. Leonard Wood is honorary president, and among the directors are Mrs. James Roosevelt, Mrs. Joseph H. Choate, Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, Mrs. Walter Damrosch, Mrs. Hamlin Garland, Mrs. Frederick Nathan, Jacob Ellis, Mrs. Elihu Root and many other women of equal standing are directing the work.

Oregon's contribution to the fund is expected to be \$3000, about one-half of which sum is expected to be raised in Portland.

BOY RIDER IS KILLED

MOTORCYCLE COLLIDES WITH TRUCK ON CAPITAL HIGHWAY.

Victim Was Riding Fast and Failed to See Auto Truck in Early Morning Fog at Road Curve.

Daniel Schnell of Tigard was instantly killed yesterday morning when his motorcycle, which he was riding collided head-on with a truck driven by M. D. Lichtenhaler of Newberg, about a half mile east of Multnomah station on the Capital highway.

The collision occurred at a curve in the road, and is believed to have failed to see the approaching auto truck in the early morning fog. Deputy Coroner Leo Goetsch made an investigation of the accident and absolved the truck driver from blame, as he said the truck was on the right side of the road.

Schnell was employed at the Multnomah station, and was on duty that day to work on his motorcycle. He was 19 years of age and lived with his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. D. Schnell, of Tigard.

Death was caused by a compound fracture of the skull, Mr. Goetsch said.
