New Apple Developed.—From an accidental seedling which he found in his yard at 112 East Fifty-fifth street, H. W. Prettyman has developed an apple which is said by F. D. Miller, William Ladd, L. Michael and other experts to be superior to the Gravenstein. From one tree—the original grafted to an older and different variety nine years ago—has this Seavariety nine years ago—has this sea-son yielded nine bushels of choice fruit. The Frettyman's Pride is an apple of about the same size as the Gravenstein which fipens with the Gravenstein, but is said to last longer. Experts describe it was more tender, richer, juicier and of better flavor than the Gravenstein. Mr. Prettyman has 250 growing trees, but only the one bearing.


