

MAYNARD DELAYED BY BROKEN MACHINE

Crankshaft Snaps as Flier Approaches Omaha

REPAIRS BEING HURRIED

Major Smith Retires From Air Derby When Plane Is Wrecked at Fernley, Nevada.

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Lieutenant B. W. Maynard, first to complete the initial lap in the army's transcontinental reliability race...

Other contestants continued to wing their way across the continent. Three landed today at San Francisco, making a total of 13 to complete the westward flight.

1425 Miles Covered. Lieutenant Maynard had covered about 225 miles after taking off from Sidney, Neb., this morning before his machine failed.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 16.—Lieutenant Maynard, who was forced to land his machine in a cornfield near Wahoo, Neb., today, will continue his trip tomorrow.

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Three more army aviators in the transcontinental race reached the western terminus at the Presidio field today and two started east on the return trip.

Plane Is Wrecked. Today's arrivals were Lieutenants F. W. Torney, 2:24:36 P. M. from Salduro; J. H. Koullet, 5:07:07 from Salt Lake City; and W. P. Brown, from Green River, Wyo., 5:01:17 P. M.

Major Smith Retires. With his nearest competitor, Captain Harry Smith, put out of the running by burning of his plane at Buffalo last night, Major Spatz, who spent the night at Rochester, held a 276-mile lead on the westward trip.

RAIL VICTIM IS STRANGER. UNIDENTIFIED EX-SERVICE MAN KILLED AT THE DALLES. Youth Is Believed to Have Brother in Portland Shipyard—Body Badly Ground Up.

THE DALLES, Or., Oct. 16.—(Special.)—An unidentified ex-service man was instantly killed at 8 o'clock this morning while attempting to board a westbound freight train at Union and Main streets.
