FIRE ESCAPE CHANGE SOUGHT—Fire escapes for all buildings "occupied above the second floor" are being considered by a special committee appointed by the city council, composed of Fire Marshal Grenfell, H. E. Plummer, city building inspector and City Attorney LaRoche. Should the committee recommend that such an ordinance be drafted and their views be adopted by the council, fire escapes could be ordered on residences of two and one-half stories, in the event that any persons occupied the attic. The committee will instruct Grenfell to make an early recommendation on the subject.

SUGAR PRICES RUSH
CANDY OFF MARKET

Louisiana Refineries Withdraw Quotation.

EUROPEAN DEMAND HURTS

Chocolate Creams and Other Fine Grades Likely Soon to Be Gone From Shops.

While the housewife has been worrying about the state of the family sugar bowl, the candy manufacturer has been wondering how the general public will enjoy life with a shortage of candy looming up. Although up to the present the retailers are apparently well stocked, someone is going to have to invent a practical sugar substitute in the next few days if chocolate creams and all the finer grades are to remain in the market.

European competition is what is hurting the candy men. On September 1 there was just 20 per cent of the Cuban sugar crop left to last them one-third of the year. The information given local dealers. All of the refineries held a meeting in New York not long ago and decided to give the candy factories 50 per cent of the amount used by them in 1918. This will equal 25 per cent of what was used in the previous year. As the business has increased over 100 per cent, they will receive about one-eighth of what they actually could use.

News Comes From East.
 This information is given in a letter received from a large eastern chocolate company by a local firm. The chocolate dealer was breaking the news gently as to the prospects of manufacturing getting sugar.

"The Louisiana refineries," he says, "had decided on a 12-cent price, f. o. b. Louisiana, but they had such an enormous business offered them they withdrew the quotation entirely and are now out of the market awaiting developments."

Refiners' Price of 9 Cents.
 "Don't overlook the fact that all of these quotations are ones on a business could we do so immediately and yet the refiners' price is only 9 cents; so you can see that the refiners have nothing to deliver or everybody would be buying at 9 cents before they would be paying the higher price for sugar."

"Today we could sell chocolate coating for export in very large quantities at prices considerably over our new list price, which we have just advanced 2 cents per pound. There isn't any sugar in Europe and one means of getting it there is by boat coatings. I wouldn't be a bit surprised if we could sell our output for the rest of the year to the export trade."

The latest monthly bulletin of the National Confectioners' association in its market reports shows that the country has cocoa beans sufficient to last only four or five weeks. A large quantity of these are not suitable for chocolate coatings.
