

"No other subject of the Bible seemed of such transcendent importance to inspiration as cendent importance to inspiration as the second advent of our Lord, for, couched in the writings of the Biblic, are no less whan fifteen hundred definite predictions of that event; three hundred, or one in every twenty-five texts in the New Testament speak ive texts in the New Testament speak of this fruitien of the hope of the Christian," said the evangelist.

MANNER OF HIS COMING. The speaker continued: "Christ's second coming is to be visible to all the world. There is to be nothing secret or mystical about it. The revelator says: "Behold, He cometh with clouds, and every eye shall see Him." (Rev. 1-7.) Christ Himself described the scene to His disciples as it will appear to the eyes of all and compared it to the lightning (Matt. compared it to the lightning (Matt. 24:27) in brilliancy and visibility, and also said it would be accompanied by great power and glory' (Mark 13:25). The day of the Lord—the close of probation, the initial outpouring of the judgments of God—will come 'as a thief in the night, but Christ's personal appearing will be visible to all.
The heavens will open, the earth
such glory as mortal eye has never
seen will burst upon the world when
he comes as King of Kings and Lord
of Lords of Lords.

ORDER OF EVENTS.

"The scriptures clearly portray the order of events in connection with His coming. Let us note them. There came a great voice out of the temple of heaven, from the throne, saying, it is done. And there were voices and thunders and lightnings; and there was a great earthquake, such as was not since men were upon the earth not since men were upon the earth . . . and the cities of the nations fell: and the cities of the nations fell; and great Babylon came in remembrance before God! (Rev. 16:17-19). The heaven departed as a scroll when it is rolled together, and every mountain and island were moved out of their places. (Rev. 8:14.)

"Then shall appear the sign of the

Son of Man in heaven; and then shall all the tribes of the earth mourn, and hey shall see the Son of Man coming the clouds of heaven with power and great glory. And he shall send His angels with a great sound of a trumpet.' (Matt. 24:30-31.) 'I looked. and behold a white cloud, and upon the cloud one sat like unto the Son of Man, having on His head a golden crown and in His hand a sharp sickle. And an angel came out of the temple, crying with a loud voice to Him that sat on the cloud: "Thrust in the sickle and rean for the time is come ickle and reup, for the time is come or Thee to reap; for the harvest of he earth is ripe." (Rev. 14:14-15.) "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump; for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorand the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed.

(1 Cor. 15:51-52) He shall send His
angels with a great sound of a trumpet, and they shall gather together
His elect from the four winds, from
one end of heaven to the other. (Matt.
24:21) See also 1 Theus. (4:15-18.)

"Again let us read." said the speak-

er, "the divine description of what it will mean to the unsaved to see Christ coming in glory; for the terror of that day must warn us now to keep within the refuge of the Saviour's loving grace: The kings of the earth, and the great men, and the rich men, and the chief captains, and the mighty men, and every bondman, and every free man, hid themselves in the dens and the rocks of the mountains. and in the rocks of the mountains, and said to the mountains and rocks, fall on us and hide us from the face of Him that sitteth on the throne, and of Him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb; for the great day of his wrath is come, and who shall be able to stand? (Rev. 6-15-17.) The same glory that transforms the righteous is a consuming fire to those who have rejected Christ's sulvation. "Then shall the wicked be revealed whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of His mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of His coming.' (2 Thess. 2:5: 2 Thess. 1:7-9.) Surely the greatest gift of grace now, as it will be then, is to be numbered among the obedient children of God."
