

## BOLSHEVIST TROOPS WIN ON ALL FRONTS

General Yudenitch Falling Back on Entire Line.

### MANY PRISONERS TAKEN

Fighting in Progress Southwest of Petrohof; Dmitrovska Entered by Red Forces.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—A bolshevist headquarters report received by wireless today says that the bolshevist troops are scoring successes on the Petrohof front against General Denikin and against Admiral Kolchak. The report states that fighting is in progress 14 miles southwest of Petrohof, 16 miles west of Petrohof on the Gulf of Finland. The red troops also have occupied positions four miles northeast of Gatchina, despite serious resistance.

On the southern front the bolshevist troops have entered Dmitrovska and Krona, respectively 19 and 27 miles southwest of Orel. In Ust Medveditskaya, one of the Don Cossack towns on the Don river, the bolshevists, it is claimed, have captured hundreds of prisoners.

**Enemy Driven Eastward.**  
On the eastern front the bolshevist forces are driving the enemy from all fortified positions toward the east.

A wireless message from Moscow reports that fighting has occurred throughout the Ukraine against the forces of General Denikin and that large bodies of the troops of General Petura and of General Makino are joining the red forces.

**Staff Headquarters Removed.**  
General Yudenitch has been compelled to abandon Gatchina and to remove staff headquarters to Yamburg, 48 miles from Petrohof on the road to Revel, and there is consequently little hope of retaining a base for the advance toward the east.

General Yudenitch, in his communication to the Prisy, declared that the attack on Petrohof had been unsuccessful because of the lack of assistance.

**Trouty Reviews Troops.**  
He saw Trouty review thousands of soldiers who enthusiastically hailed him as a "divine leader." Colonel Malone said that the bolshevists asserted that General Denikin had lost the confidence and support of the allies and had reached an understanding with the bolshevists.

Colonel Malone entered Russia from Revel, passing through the Estonian lines.

## TELEGRAPHERS TO WAIT

STRIKE HELD UP PENDING ACTION BY HINES.

Immediate Decision as to Wage Increases Is Asked, but Director Has Not Acted.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 29.—The 21 chairmen of the Order of Railway Telegraphers here, late today decided not to order a strike vote among their 24,000 members before communicating with Director General of Railroads Hines.

A telegram was sent to Director General Hines on the 29th of the purpose of the meeting and asking him to put the wage increase into effect at once. The chairman of the order of the railway telegraphers stated that in case he did not do this, the chairman had voted to order a strike vote at once. President Manion announced that the chairman would remain in session until an answer had been received from Mr. Hines.

The railway telegraphers assert that an award that would grant them approximately 5 cents an hour increase was made by former Director of Railroads McAdoo, but that they have been unable to obtain any satisfactory interpretation of this award from Mr. Hines or any of the railroad.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Director General Hines has not reached a decision on the wage demand of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. Details of the negotiations made by the board of railway wages were discussed today by officials of the railroad administration with President Lee and the union's strike committee to develop how the recommendations would work in practical application.

Mr. Hines hopes to make an award in the case in the near future.

## ROYAL RIGHTS RENOUNCED

Austrian ex-Archduke and Family Surrender Prerogatives.

VIENNA, Oct. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—The former Archduke Francis, Salvador, son-in-law of the late Emperor Francis Joseph, his three sons and three daughters, and the former Archduke Peter Ferdinand, Grand Duke of Tuscany and Archduke Maria Theresa have renounced all their royal prerogatives under the act of April 3 last and have declared themselves faithful citizens of the republic.

The national assembly has ratified their renunciation. They retain their private fortunes and private estates.

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## MAYORS DISCUSS H. C. L.

144 MUNICIPAL EXECUTIVES INVITED TO CONFERENCE.

Sacramento City Commissioner Advocates Boycott of Certain Foodstuffs When Price Excessive.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 29.—Of many plans prepared for consideration at the conference here tomorrow of mayors from three western states to discuss high living costs, none seems to have attracted greater interest than the boycott idea of D. W. Carmichael, Sacramento city commissioner.

Carmichael suggested that the public abstain from buying certain foodstuffs when prices seemed excessive and this plan was carried into effect here on a small scale through co-operation of several civic organizations.

A decline in the price of eggs on the local market shortly thereafter was attributed by Carmichael to the boycott.

Public hearings on high living costs were held by the Sacramento city commission and to secure co-operation of municipal executives elsewhere invitations for a conference in Washington, Oregon and California.

The resolution of invitation adopted by the city commission said: Whereas, All portions of our beloved city are being confronted by the serious and seemingly insurmountable problems of the high cost of living, and whereas, it devolves upon these authorities and authority to use every human endeavor to alleviate the suffering of the people in this respect; and whereas, there exists a great division of opinion as to the ways and means which may be used to bring about a reduction in the common necessities of life, and whereas, we believe results in this direction will follow united efforts of the various municipalities of the Pacific coast states, therefore be it

Resolved, That this commission through its president, shall invite the mayors of Sacramento and California to meet in assembly at Sacramento on October 29, 1919, for the purpose of devising a plan or program to be put into operation which shall be deemed best to bring about a reduction in the cost of living necessities to our people.

## IDAHO HAS NEW MINES

FEDERAL PERMISSION SECURED TO BUILD SPUR TRACK.

Teton County Fields Said to Hold More Than 13,000,000 Tons of Best Coal in Northwest.

BOISE, Ida., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—If the Oregon Short Line and the Idaho Coal Mine company can reach an understanding, coal mines at Driggs in Teton county, holding in excess of 13,000,000 tons of the best coal in the northwest, according to official reports, will be opened up to Idaho consumers through the threatened strike, and as a source of regular supply hereafter.

Walker D. Hines, director-general of railroads, in a telegram today to Governor Davis announced that the railroad administration will impose no objection to the building of a spur to the mines. Inaccessibility to transportation is said to be the only obstacle in the way of operating the mines. At the local office of the Oregon Short Line it was announced that the mine fields are highly regarded by officials of the company at Salt Lake.

The coal mine company asked Governor Davis Monday to demand of the railroad administration permission to build the spur, and it was in response to Governor Davis' telegram that Director Hines gave the railroad administration consent to the project. The Teton fields are highly regarded by State Mine Inspector Robert N. Bell as a source of supply for Idaho.

## MOSES AND JOHNSON REJECTED IN SENATE

Last of 46 Treaty Proposals Becomes History.

JOHNSON AGAIN DEFEATED

Fight for Elimination of Labor Section Will Be Launched Today; Week's Debate Expected.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The 46 amendments attached to the peace treaty passed into history today when the last survivor, a proposal by Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire, to revise voting strength in the league of nations was defeated in the senate, 47 to 36.

The senate then upset two more textual changes brought in by individual senators. One presented by Senator Sherman, republican, Illinois, and proposing to write into the treaty preamble a reference to the deity, was laid on the table by a vote of 57 to 27.

The other, sponsored by Senator Johnson, republican, California, as a new solution for voting inequality in the league, was killed, 43 to 35.

At adjournment, however, the effort to hasten final action had been brought up against an obstacle which seemed likely to prevent further progress for several days.

**Labor Fight Due.**  
Tomorrow a determined group of senators will launch a fight to eliminate the labor section of the treaty, a debate which will last, leaders expect, for a week. The battle is expected to be the more spirited because it is regarded as holding out whatever hope remains of writing any amendment into the treaty.

Nine republicans joined the democrats in overthrowing the Moses amendment, which provided that none of the British dominions should vote in any league controversy directly affecting any one of them. Three democrats voted with the republicans supporting it.

On the new Johnson amendment, proposed as a substitute for the one rejected last week, the lineup was the same as on his original proposal, the only changes in the record vote being due to absence and pairs. Most of the republican leaders hoped to defeat the Sherman amendment.

**La Follette Sees Peril.**  
The greater part of the day's debate related to subjects not directly under consideration. The labor section got the largest share of attention. Senator La Follette, republican, Wisconsin, centering discussion about it with a three-hour speech assailing the proposed international labor organization as filled with peril to American labor.

During consideration of Senator Sherman's amendment, the debate rolled into the realm of literature and religion. "It would be a travesty," said Mr. La Follette, "to make divine blessing on such a treaty."

Other opponents pointed out that the American constitution had endured without containing a reference to the deity, and declared such a reference in the treaty would make trouble because of the many religious representations.

The motion to table was made by Senator Robinson, republican, Utah, who had voted for several committee amendments. He pleaded that the amendments were consistently opposing all amendments as a matter of principle should not be considered.

**Chehalis Cashier Resigns.**  
CHEHALIS, Wash., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—A. S. Cory has tendered his resignation as cashier of the Chehalis National bank, which position he has held since the institution was founded. He first engaged in the banking business in Chehalis 17 years ago. Mr. Cory retains his stock in the bank. He will engage in the life insurance business. Mr. Cory's successor as cashier of the Chehalis National has not yet been announced.
