

TOYS GIVE PENNIES TO MEMORIAL FUND

Small Bank Broken Open for
Roosevelt Cause.

FINAL REPORTS AWAITED

Campaign Continues Until Definite
Announcement Is Made That
Quota Is Subscribed.

Two little children, appearing in state headquarters of the Roosevelt memorial fund, astonished the campaign officials yesterday with a shower of pennies, nickels, and dimes—\$1.43 by actual count and tally—which bought for them memberships in the association to perpetuate the memory of a certain genial and gallant gentleman known to kiddies as "Poppy."

"Where did this money come from?" inquired an official, flipping the coins into their respective piles. "We saved it," said the leader of the small boys. "My brother and I have been saving it most all summer, and this morning we bust our bank wide open because we wanted to give it to the fund you folks are taking up."

Campaign Nears Close.
The belief prevails at headquarters that the campaign is within a day or so of its close. If all reports were in, say officials, and if a majority of those who wish to subscribe have been seen, there is no doubt but that the Oregon quota of \$25,000 would be found to be subscribed in full. But the campaign must not lag until definite computation places Oregon well beyond her task and tribute.

"Our workers show no disposition to quit," said Edgar B. Piper Jr., state campaign manager, "nor do the citizens of the state seem to have lost interest in the drive. Outside counties are all doing well with the exception of Linn, with a small quota of \$480, where the progress of the drive seems to have lagged. But we are assured that Linn county, through its chairman, P. R. Kelly of Albany, will be with its sister counties when the reports of completed quotas are announced."

Coupons Are Indication.
The newspaper subscription coupons, published in Portland and out-of-state papers, are unquestioned indicators of the continued enthusiasm of the general public for the memorial fund. From this source alone, state headquarters received \$263 yesterday, largely forwarded by individual Portland subscribers.

State headquarters has received \$2500 throughout the campaign from the source of the newspaper coupons, a double-acting soliciting and advertising device originated by T. B. Neuhausen of the campaign committee. This amount does not take into consideration the many coupons which have been received by community and business campaign leaders, and which have not yet been reported on. Subscriptions through the medium of the coupons have been received by the Oregon committee over an area represented by the two extremes, New Hampshire and southern California.

The retail division of the local campaign, with 150 sub-committees, has not yet completed its work. But four or five of the captains have reported complete canvasses and quotas for their trade divisions. Charles F. Berg, chairman of the division, urges the captains and team workers should complete their fields at the earliest moment and turn in their reports to headquarters.

Memorial Meetings Held.
A message received at state headquarters yesterday, from William Boyce Thompson, national president of the Roosevelt Memorial association, announces that 200,000 memorial meetings were held throughout America on Monday, the anniversary of Colonel Roosevelt's birth, with many millions of citizens in attendance. It is estimated that, to date, more than 1,000,000 subscribers have joined the association and are participants in the memorial tribute. Montana alone has 50,000 subscribers.

"Please pass the word," telegraphed President Thompson, "to all county and local chairmen, urging them to take advantage of the present deep-seated desire of the American people to join this association."

Among the notable subscriptions received yesterday was that of Al Kader shrine, to the amount of \$100.

STATE TEACHES THRIFT

SCHOOLS CALLED ON TO TAKE
UP GOVERNMENT LESSONS.

J. A. Churchill Urges Teachers to
Train Pupils in Economy and a
Better Citizenship.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—In a campaign co-operative with that now being promoted by the United States government to inculcate the minds of the school children of Oregon the necessity of thrift, J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction and state director of thrift education, today launched a drive which he says will be carried to all parts of the commonwealth.

In a letter to every school teacher in the state he calls attention to the campaign and the manual prepared by the government, which contains 15 lessons in thrift.

"The final test of your work as a teacher is the character of the children who are being trained by you," the superintendent says. "Will they become effective citizens with correct ideas on all moral and civic questions? Right habits of thought are fundamental in the making of a good citizen. Will you, therefore, as a part of your work this year, not only teach the lessons offered in the government manual, but also help your boys and girls to establish a definite and systematic plan for saving their earnings?"

Much of the money necessary to conduct the drive is being donated by bankers and other men prominent in the campaign for good citizenship.

PORTLAND STUDENT THOUGHT
TO HAVE BEEN DROWNED.

Swim in River Near Lafayette Is
Believed to Have Been Fatal,
but Body Is Not Recovered.

LAFAYETTE, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Erael Griner, age 21, of Lafayette is believed to have been drowned in the river here Sunday. The body has not yet been recovered.

Numbree warned him that the cold water might produce cramps.

On Sunday night when he failed to return his clothing was found on the river bank above the depot here and his bare foot prints were found in the sand near the water.

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REPUBLICANS RULE WASHINGTON BOARDS

Appointee of Governor Hart
to Take Office Saturday.

TACOMA MAN FILES OATH

J. J. Cameron to Succeed G. Dove
McQuestion as Member of
State Control Body.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—James J. Cameron of Tacoma, ex-state representative and ex-assessor of Pierce county, has filed his oath of office and bond as a member of the state board of control and with G. Dove, McQuestion on November 1. Mr. Cameron is an active republican worker, known throughout the state. Mr. McQuestion was named by Governor Lister as the republican candidate of the board soon after Lister took office in 1913. Mr. McQuestion had served as a member of the house from Pierce county before his appointment.

The appointment of Mr. Cameron, announced several weeks ago by Louis F. Hart, does not change the political complexion of the board, for there still are two democrats and one republican in the membership. It has been announced, though, that T. B. Skaggs, democratic member and chairman of the board, will retain his place, so it is assumed in political circles that the majority of the board is in entire accord with the gubernatorial wishes. Inasmuch as one change has been made on the board of managers for the Monroe reformatory, a board consisting of the three members of the board of control and two civilians—Governor Hart on Saturday will also have a majority in that organization.

Action Not Announced.
If Governor Hart contemplates any immediate action when Mr. Cameron takes office on Saturday, friends of the new appointee declare the fact has not been made known to Mr. Cameron. The latter has just returned from an eastern trip and had opportunity to file his oath of office. Since then there has been no conference between the two.

It is generally understood, however, that Governor Hart contemplates an early change in the superintendent of the Monroe reformatory. In fact, it is generally understood that Superintendent Donald B. Olson has resigned. In political circles it has been accepted as a fact that Colonel W. M. Inglis would be offered the berth. That the change would not be made until Mr. Cameron went to the board also has been taken for granted.

Move Shrouded in Mystery.
Because of the uncertainty that exists in political circles regarding the wardenship of the state penitentiary even close friends of the state administration are venturing no prediction as to what office, if any, Mr. Cameron will hold.

That Governor Hart would like to have Warden Henry Drum retain his position, but if federal authorities should get around to the point of making him warden of the McNeil island, it is felt that Mr. Cameron would have to be found. But outside of official circles this move is shrouded in mystery.

It is well known that Governor Hart does not wish to disturb state institutions any more than is necessary. It is assumed that very few other appointments are in prospect.

BRITAIN AIDING FRANCE
Inhabitants of 500 Small Towns
and Villages Receive Help.

LONDON.—Five hundred small towns and villages in the devastated regions of France have been "adopted" by the British committee of the French Red Cross society. The inhabitants of each of these hamlets are being assisted in their struggle to re-establish themselves in their former homes.

In many instances they are living in the cellars of their ruined houses. Other returned refugees have to be content with living under sheets of corrugated iron leaned against a bit of broken wall.

**Wooden Hulls May Be Completed
in Readiness for Service at
\$70 Deadweight Ton.**

Under instructions that reached the coast yesterday the shipping board is not only offering for sale wood hulls of the Ferris type at lower figures than were previously quoted, but has instructed its representatives to dispose of complete outfits for the completion of the hulls as steamers. It is calculated that the cost of hulls and machinery makes it possible for the vessels to be finished in readiness for service under \$70 a ton, deadweight.

Compared with the cost of wood steamers to the government originally, which was above the prices asked today for completed carriers of the same type, the new sales proposal paves the way for the acquisition of steamers at less than half the wartime prices.

There are hulls at Alameda, Portland and Seattle now available for sale, and large stocks, embracing all equipment and fittings necessary, are warehoused at Alameda, Portland and Tacoma. There are several deals now in process of negotiation and when these are closed little time need be lost in getting a steamer ready for installation in steel vessels, and there are some coast operators planning the purchase of steel hulls for wood hulls. The fixing of prices on the ships and full sets of equipment is the first definite announcement of a flat figure being made for both, as heretofore while hulls have been listed at an approximate figure on deadweight tonnage, the purchase of equipment has been on a basis of the cost of appraised value of each item.

BOND THIEF BEGINS TERM
Frank Wagner, Convicted in Astoria, at Penitentiary.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Frank Wagner, who pleaded guilty in Clatsop county courts recently to the theft of liberty bonds and money aggregating \$10,000, arrived at the penitentiary tonight to serve a maximum term of 40 years.
