

7 COUNTIES JOIN REQUEST FOR ROADS Delegates to Confer With Commissioners Today.

GOOD OFFICES OFFERED Permanent Organization to Work for Benefit of Central Oregon is Contemplated.

Seven counties formed an organization at the Imperial hotel yesterday to do team work for the development of state highways in central Oregon.

The object of this group of counties to advocate the early completion of The Dalles-California highway as whatever is done on this road will help all the counties concerned.

The other highways in which the association is interested is the central Oregon highway, which will connect Burns with Bend, and the road from Prineville in Crook county to Bend.

There is also a contract for improvement of the highway for a few miles south of Bend towards LaTone in Jefferson county line to Madras.

Men from Deschutes county say that the commission should not have rejected the Bend-Jefferson county line bid, for it permitted an early working season and there were other reasons which would have justified the commission in making an award.

"This association is not a club over the heads of the commission," R. L. Hass of Burns, took pains to explain. "It is simply an association of voices the road needs and desires of seven counties. Instead of seven different delegations making requests, the association can serve as a clearing house for these requests and then put them up to the commission."

It will also be the policy of the association to see that the commission has a meeting at which central Oregon county bids are under consideration or discussion.

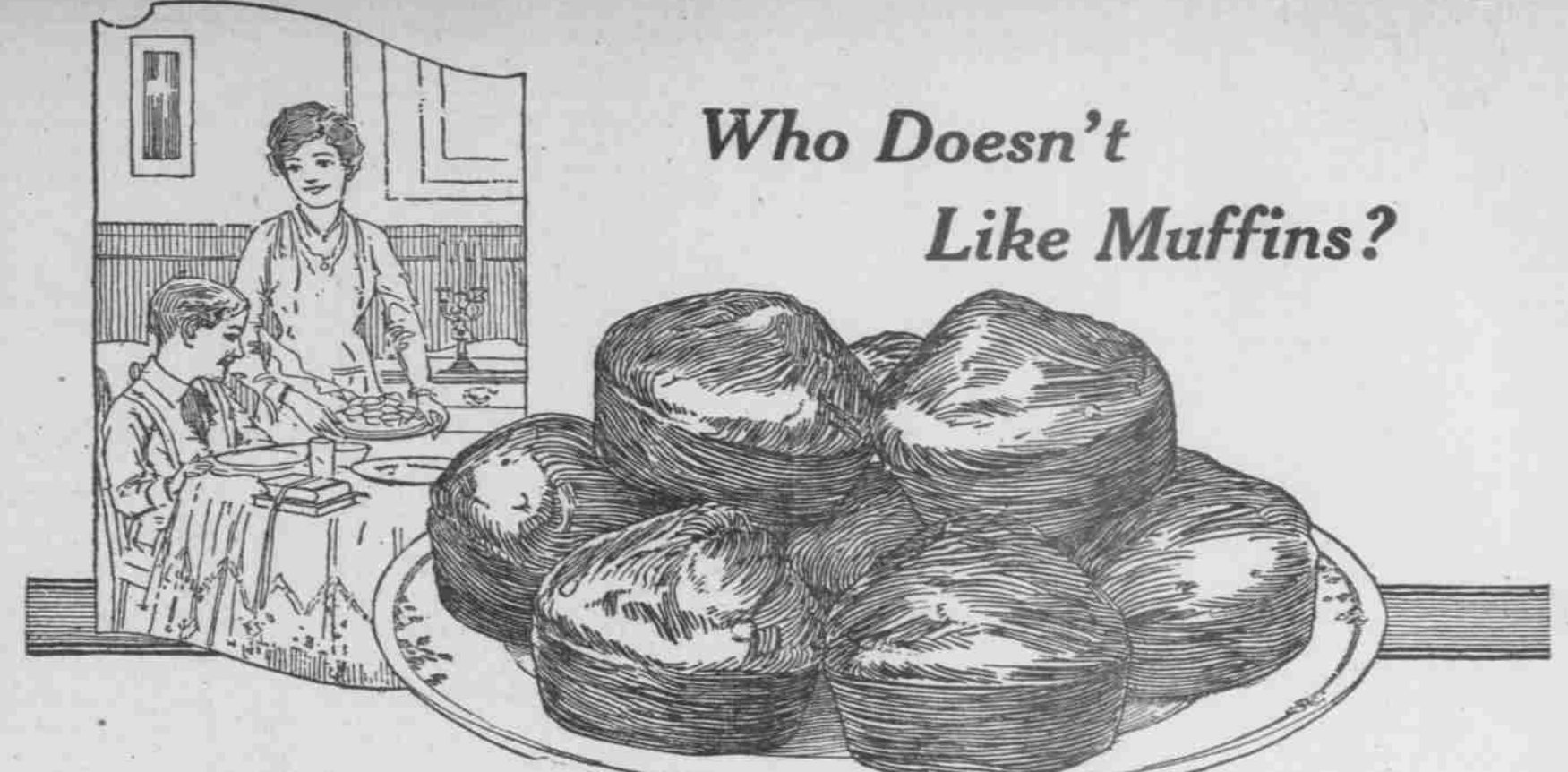

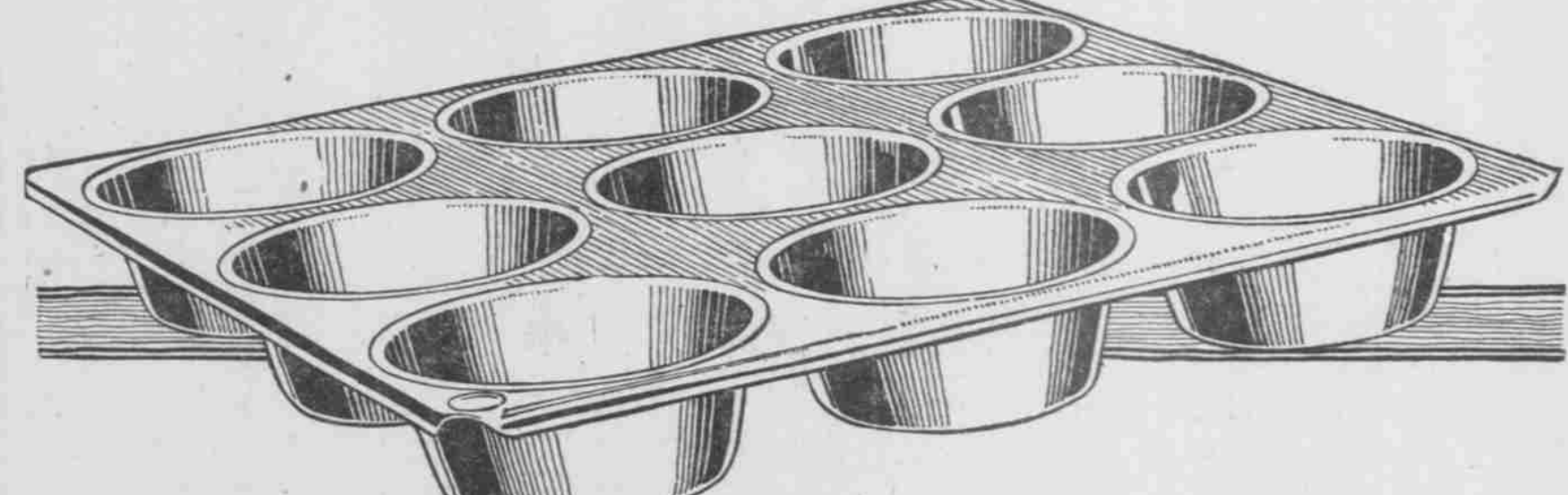
