It was task of the minister, he pointed t, to bring before the people of his lividual church the full realization the tremendous problems that connt the country. In this way the irch people would be enlightened to these problems, and thus clear way for possible adjustments. ev. Arthur J. Sullens, state super-endent of home missions, spoke of progress that is being made in inter-church movement. He gave an illustration the remarkable adment of church conditions in Mon-a.
