

BEYSON WINS FIRST CONTEST OF SEASON

Triple Pass Defeats Columbia Eleven, 7 to 0.

CLEVER FOOTBALL SEEN

First Period Is Kicking Contest Between Hill of Benson and Johnson of Columbia.

Benson won his first game of the season when the fighting Mechanics handed out a 7-0 defeat to Columbia yesterday afternoon on the Multnomah gridiron.

The pass was one of the neatest bits of football that has been shown in the intercollegiate league this season and caught the Columbia team completely off guard.

Kicking Contest Staged. The first period was a kicking contest between Hill of Benson and Johnson of Columbia, with the heroes absent at evenly divided.

In the second period Benson put across the only score of the game when, with only a few minutes left to play, Coach Billy Bryan's boys worked the triple pass which brought home the bacon for the Mechanics.

At the start of the second half Columbia opened up and a pass to Tom Dwyer, started the ball toward the Benson goal line.

Two Regulars Are Out. Johnson immediately punted out of danger and during the rest of the game the ball was kicked back forth across the center of the field.

Coach George Dewey kept Buss Douglas and Captain Charley Lake, two of his regulars, out of the game during the first half, but was forced to use them in the second session in an effort to win the victory.

For Columbia George "Blue-Board" McKel and Murdoch showed up well in the backfield, with Johnson and Tony Dwyer played well on the line.

Hill and Captain Lind showed to good advantage in the backfield, with White, Kiehl, and Falis starred on the line.

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BIG PACKING HOUSE TO BE BUILT IN PORTLAND

\$500,000 Concern Independent of Eastern Capital.

SITE INCLUDES 15 ACRES

Consolidation of Sterrett and Portland Rendering Companies Made. Large Exports Predicted.

Portland is to have a new large packing plant that will be owned and operated independently of any interests associated with the large eastern packers, and which will have a capitalization of \$500,000.

The plant will take over the present business of the Sterrett Packing company and also that of the Portland Rendering company.
