During the day the reservation drafted by the foreign relations committee, almost identical with one which President Wilson has announced he would regard as a rejection of the treaty, weathered all attempts to alter it, and railied a support which seemed to insure final acceptance. A vote is expected tomorrow.

The reservation provides that under the article, which pledges member states to preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and political independence of all other members, the United States shall assume no obligation to use its naval or military forces except on express authorization of congress in every specific case.

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
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
