BRITISH STEAMER TOTAL LOSS. ALL HANDS RESCUED.

Shipping Board Craft Answers Wireless Call; 140 Women and Children Among Passengers.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 18 -- (Spe. (al.)-Trapped in the wreck of the British steamship Fazilka, ashore on the rocky coast of Nicobar island, India, 611 men, women and children were rescued from imminent peril without the loss of a single life, by Captain Omar J. Humphrey, master of the shipping board steamship West Modus of Seattle.

First news of the wreck of the Fa tilks and the rescue of all abourd, including 140 women and children was received by wireless and cable from the orient this morning. Bound from Penang to Madras, the Fazilka crashed ashore, impaling her

bottom on the jagged rocks that fringe Nicobar island, Bay of Bengal, inte in October. Realizing his vessel was doomed and that every hour increased the danger of the great number of men

women and children aboard, the mas ter of the Fazilka immediately sen out the wireless call of distress The message was picked up by the West Modus, steaming from the Suca canal for Singapore, and Captain Humphrey, diverting the course of his vessel, speeded to the rescue.
