

FRANCE IN DILEMMA OVER PEACE TREATY

U. S. Senate's Action Raises Serious Problem.

NEW PACT IS SUGGESTED

Assembly Is Much Concerned Over Change in Relations With Berlin Now Threatened.

PARIS, Nov. 23.—(Special cable.)—The newly-elected French assembly has before it the possibility of negotiating a new treaty with Germany. The assembly has elected must support the treaty as it stands, and the restrictions placed by the United States senate materially change the treaty, according to the French viewpoint. The restrictions regarding article 16, to moderate French view, nullify the treaty and bring the whole situation back to the point before President Wilson came to Europe.

Wilson Proposal Accepted.

Belgium was to go to Cologne and France to hold the rest of the river to Switzerland with wide bridge-heads on the right bank. The Rhine country was to be divided into buffer states, making France and Belgium safe against invasion if Germany had another attack of megalomania like that of 1914.

Senate Changes Situation.
