

BULGARIA BOWS TO TERMS OF ALLIES

Greece Rejoices at Submission of Ancient Enemy.

CEREMONY IS AT NEUILLY

Indemnity of \$445,000,000 Must Be Paid and Standing Army Cut to 20,000 Men.

PARIS, Nov. 27.—M. Stamboullieff, premier of Bulgaria, signed the treaty of peace between his country and the allied powers at the Neuilly town hall at 10:40 o'clock this morning.

The event was attended by a simplicity and lack of formality which is indicative of the decreasing interest in the work of the peace conference, though for certain powers, such as Greece, today's ceremony was the culmination in part of the hopes of centuries.

Greek Delegate Rejoices. "We have waited 1500 years for this day," said a member of the Greek delegation on entering the hall of ceremonies in the mayor's office at Neuilly, which is not to be compared with the Chateaux de Versailles and St. Germain as the setting for such an event.

Bulgaria was represented at the peace table by Mr. Stamboullieff, her premier.

All the other delegates were in their seats when M. Stamboullieff's name was announced at 10:40 o'clock. The Bulgarian premier, with bushy black hair, sharp black eyes and robust physique, sat with cold formality when he entered and took his seat. Premier Clemenceau, as president of the peace conference, rose immediately and invited him to sign. Two minutes later the first signature had been appended to the treaty of Neuilly.

Staging of Ceremony Simple.

The simple staging of the ceremony and the clouded skies, combined with the probable inadvertent but complete isolation of Bulgaria's delegate at the peace table, spread a sort of gloom over the scene. M. Stamboullieff occupied a seat at the extreme corner of the table nearest the outside door with a number of vacant seats between him and the neighboring delegates.

By the conditions of the treaty which was signed yesterday at the Neuilly town hall, Bulgaria is called upon to surrender all works of art and valuables taken from allied countries during the war and to pay an indemnity of approximately \$445,000,000. Bulgaria is deprived of Thrace and also loses Strumitza, a small triangular section of territory, the latter being assigned to Serbia. Proposals which would give Bulgaria a corridor through Thrace to the Aegean sea, were left to the future disposition of the allied governments. The boundary between Roumania and Bulgaria is changed in many places.

Compulsory Service Abolished.

Compulsory military service in Bulgaria is abolished by the treaty terms, the Bulgarian army being reduced to 20,000 men, with a gendarmerie or police force not exceeding 10,000. All arms andammunition, with the exception of small arms and light machine guns, are turned over to the allies. A commission composed of allied representatives is given power to search all arms committed by Bulgarians during the war and also deal with the repatriation of prisoners.

PRESIDENT EATS QUAIL

EXECUTIVE HAS THANKSGIVING DINNER IN SICK BED.

Officials Attend 12th Annual Pan-American Mass with South America Diplomats.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—President Wilson ate his Thanksgiving day dinner properly, but Secretary Trumble, clerk of the house of representatives, again supplied turkey for the White House from his Kentucky farm, but the president's physician, Rear-Admiral Grayson, would not permit him to eat any kind of food. The president had quail instead.

Before dinner Mr. Wilson was wheeled out to the south lawn of the White House, where he spent an hour with Mrs. Wilson and his daughter, Miss Margaret Wilson. The only guest at the White House was Miss Lucy Maury of Roanoke, Va., a niece of Mrs. Wilson.

Government officials, Latin-American diplomats and church dignitaries joined in Thanksgiving today at the 12th annual Pan-American mass at St. Patrick's church, where Rev. J. A. Cunnane of Baltimore delivered the sermon. The ceremonies were in charge of Very Rev. Edward G. Fitzgerald of the Catholic university.

Among the many reasons for our Thanksgiving on the present occasion," said Rev. Father Cunnane in his sermon, "may be accounted the very occasion itself, the annual recurrence in this church of the religious solemnities whereby the spirit of concord and amity and of mutual service among the American republics is fostered and blessed.

Flags of many nations were used for the church decorations, the Stars and Stripes draped the stations of the cross and the pillars, while the standards of Central and South American countries were suspended between the pillars, the colors of the allied countries were spread fanlike from the balcony.

Among those attending the services were the ambassadors and ministers from Central and South American countries, including those from Chile, Argentina, Bolivia, Guatemala, Venezuela, Ecuador, Colombia, the Dominican republic, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Haiti, Salvador, Uruguay, Brazil, Peru, Panama and Cuba.

Cabinet members, representatives of the army and navy and other government departments were also among the guests.

SUNDAY GAS SALE BAN ON

Baltimore Warns Autoists to Lay in Supply.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 27.—Automobilists were warned today through an order issued by Police Marshal Carter for enforcement of the Sunday selling and works laws, to supply themselves with enough gasoline to carry them over Sunday, since he regards the sale on that day as an act neither of charity nor necessity, which the laws exempt.

WIRELESS GUARDS FLIER

BORDER PATROL IS GIVEN GREATER SAFETY.

String of Stations Will Stretch From the Pacific Coast to the Gulf of Mexico.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 27.—Wireless telephone sending apparatus is now being used to guide the aerial border patrol of the Mexican border line, according to Colonel J. E. Humphill, chief signal officer of the western department, who is soon to leave for the border to inspect the wireless equipment. Four new sending stations have been installed. Colonel Humphill says, each with a radius of 100 miles.

The "object of the wireless" said Colonel Humphill, "is to enable the authorities to keep in momentary communication with the border patrol of airplanes that is constantly maintained. The Mexican border line within the jurisdiction of the western department of the army is now completely equipped with wireless telephone sending apparatus that will reach an army airplane at any place along the border.

The wireless will reduce to a minimum the chances of a pilot becoming lost, as the position of an airplane and its general direction from the land station can be fairly accurately gauged with the army's telephonic equipment. As soon as the signal corps of the western department completes the installation of its wireless telephone sets the army will have a row of stations from the Pacific to the Gulf of Mexico."

The train was established on Sundays to handle the outing traffic to Lakeview and the Sandhill lakes and to accommodate residents at Reedsport and Gardiner, and was at first intended as a summer resort train, to be discontinued at the close of the season, but the traffic was so well the train will be continued as a regular Sunday accommodation.
