ARGENTINE AND CHILE AGREE ON JOINT TRANSACTION.

Chilean Parliament Authorizes Five Million Pound Expenditure for Port Development.

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 28 - An agreement by which the governments of Argentine and Chile would jointly loan the trans-Andean railroad of the two countries a million pounds sterling for the improvement of their trans-continental line, was perfected in conference here last night at which were present representatives of the two governments and the rail systems. The scheme provides for the fusion of funds and management. The new financial arrangement wa

The new financial arrangement was undertaken in order to permit the roads to meet the increasing demands made upon them and to insure service the year round.

Advances of money from governmental sources would enable the railroads to purchase additional rolling stock, reconstruct the roadbeds across the mountains as a means of avoiding the landsildes and snowsildes which frequently obstruct the railroad, blocking its operation in the winter.
