

TAKING OF CENSUS STARTS JANUARY 1

19 Questions Will Be Asked by Enumerators.

WOMEN ASKED TO ASSIST

Penalty is Provided for Failure to Answer Questions or to Receive Canvasser.

If your mother-in-law lives in your house and you don't know whether her father was born in Dublin or Cork, ask her and ask her now. If you aren't sure whether father paid off the mortgage last spring, you'd better find out now also. If your sick-abled uncle from the old country doesn't know the date he took out his naturalization papers, you'd better look that up along with the rest.

Warning is Issued. Housewives are warned to familiarize themselves with the questions and obtain information from others living with them, in order that the work may go as rapidly as possible. Only two weeks are allowed for the collection of statistics. Mr. Bennett makes the request that they also be prepared to take solicitors into their houses and provide a table on which the long blanks may be filled out. In the case of foreign-born it is absolutely necessary that all papers relating to naturalization should be left at the house during the month of January, so the enumerator can see them. This applies not only to members of the family, but to all other persons who reside there permanently.

All enumerators have been selected and are ready to begin work. In Multnomah county 1625 applications for positions were received, only 238 of these being for the canvass of agricultural districts. Of these, 850 were asked to fill out blanks and 640 responded, 487 taking the test and 258 passing. Twenty-three agricultural applicants took the test and 14 passed. Out of the 296 successful 237 were women, 123 being housewives.

Penalty is Provided. A summary of the questions to be asked is given below. The government has provided a penalty for refusal to answer these or to receive the enumerator. The schedule is as follows:

1. How many members of the family are living permanently at home?
2. Who is the head of the family? Name in order those most nearly related to the head of the family, beginning with the wife, children in order (beginning at the eldest), relatives, boarders, roomers, servants, etc.
3. Give the names of other persons not members of the family who reside permanently with the family.
4. Give age, at last birthday, sex, race of each member of the family, whether married, single, widowed or divorced.
5. Were all members of family or persons residing with family born within the United States?
6. If born in a foreign country, state where and give date of arrival in the United States.
7. Has any member of the family or person residing permanently with the family been naturalized or declared his intention to become a citizen?
8. If so, give the date of naturalization if full citizen; date of first papers if declared intention.
9. Has any member or person residing there permanently attended school of any kind since the first day of September, 1919?
10. Is there any member of the family or other person residing there who cannot read and write twenty languages?
11. Give birthplace of each person, including members of the family who reside there permanently, and of all native-born or foreign-born.
12. Give birthplace of the father of each person residing there permanently and his native tongue if foreign-born. Give birthplace of the mother of each person, including members of the family, that reside there permanently and her native tongue if foreign-born.
13. Is there any member of the family or other person residing permanently with the family who does not speak English?
14. What is the occupation of each person, including members of the family residing there permanently?
15. Does the house in which they are living belong to some member of the family or is it rented?
16. If house is owned by head of family or by some member of the family, state whether mortgaged or free of incumbrance.
17. Are there any outbuildings on the premises in which horses, cattle, sheep, pigs or mules are kept?
18. Does any member of the family own or operate a farm?
19. Are there any members of the family that are either blind, deaf or mute?

A. Howard, city superintendent from the Portland firm to which the material was shipped. In addition to this sum, prizes amounting to \$25 were given to the schools that collected the most papers and magazines, making a total of \$486.72 to be used for the improvement of the rooms of the several buildings.

Mr. Fitzgerald is the father of Jesse Fitzgerald, who is now in service in Germany and who was with the famous first division for 16 months at the front. MAN AND GIRL, ALLEGED RUM-AWAYS, ARRESTED.

Miss Ruby Cairns, 19, and William F. Langstaff, Reputed Married Man, in Custody.

Miss Ruby Blanche Evelyn Cairns, pretty 19-year-old stenographer of Saskatoon, Sask., and William F. Langstaff, merchant of the same city, were picked up yesterday by City Inspector Craddock and are held pending advices from the authorities of Saskatoon. The two are said to have run away from Saskatoon together about September 1 and the girl has been sought since that time by her parents through the Saskatoon police. Circumstances giving the number of the man's name and other information were received in Portland some time ago. Inspector Craddock had some business at Broadway and Clatsop street yesterday afternoon and while walking down the street noticed a Canadian car standing at the side of the street. A girl was sitting in the car and she was soon joined by a man. "Good afternoon, Mr. Langstaff," said the inspector, walking up and greeting the man. The man replied in kind. The inspector asked them to drive around to the police station. "I suppose you have a warrant for my arrest," said Mr. Langstaff. "All I have is a star and a gun," was the reply.
