

RETURNING AMERICANS TELL OF BOLSHEVIK ATTACK.

19 Are Killed and 27 Wounded in Fighting on June 25-Reinforcements Save Detachment,

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 5.—(Spe-cial.)—First-hand details of a massa-cre of American troops in Siberia by the bolsheviki were brought to Hono-hulu with the arrival of the United States army transport Sherman with a contingent of "Siberian Wolfhounds" homeward bound.
