INJUNCTION TO EXCLUDE ALL SOUGHT AT SPOKANE.

Sweeping Action Proposed to Curb Radicals—Sixty in Jail Mentioned as Defendants.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 10.—An injunction to restrain all members of the Industrial Workers of Order from continuing their practices and activities in Spokane county was sought yesterday by Prosecuting Attorney Lindsey and a hearing will be held before Superior Judge Webster tomorrow morning.

The proposed injunction, which is a sweeping one, is believed to be the first of its kind ever used to curb the activities of groups of individuals. It mentions as defendants, 60 alleged I. W. O. members in jail awaiting trial on charges of criminal syndicalism under a state law and all others not now known whose names and identities will be ascertained by Lindsey, associating, confederating, affiliating and acting in concert with said named defendants, men or groups, or an organization commonly known and called Industrial Workers of the World.

Under the injunction's terms any man who advocated the principles of the I. W. O. by word of mouth or by circulating literature of the organization would be adjudged in contempt of court and punished accordingly. The complaint refers to the Armistice day tragedy at Centralia, Wash., where 100 members of the American Legion were shot down and killed, and alleges that continued preaching of the Industrial Workers of the World will result in further lawlessness and destruction of life and property.
