GOVERNMENT FLOUR

High Cost of Living; Flour Short- Josephus Daniels Will Do age Rumor Is Denied.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 .- The United States grain corporation announced today that the government's pure wheat flour is on sale in small packages "at moderate prices" in hundreds of retail grocery throughout the country, and merchants selling it will be provided on their customers of the fact. In supplementary statement by Watson S. Moore, second vice-president of the orporation, consumers are informed substitute article, but derived from pure wheat.

Moore, "should also understand that this campaign is in no sense designed to discredit their regular business, or the brands which they ordinarily handle. They recognize, I am sure, that this is but part of a general camaign on the part of the government b reduce the high cost of living." Mr. Moore added that rumors of flour shortage are without foundaion and that flour stocks are approximately 50 per cent larger than they were at this time last year.
