

STATE IRRIGATION CONGRESS OPENS

with some of the things I have recently heard, such as calling these malcontents together and discussing with them the way to run our government. I cannot see it that way. There are too many red-blooded Americans to keep this government running right and we are going to do it.

We have shipped one full ark of those who do not like our form of government and have been preaching its overthrow and I say, let's ship 100 more arks full, if necessary. If there are more who like better the countries from which they come, we will send them back. I hope, so they may live there. Members of this irrigation congress can help wonderfully in keeping down radicalism by standing out fully against it in every form, wherever it rears its head. The farmers are the backbone of this and every other state and are not given to heading radical talk, and we must have your earnest help in stamping out 'red' propaganda and in keeping the state 100 per cent American.

Mayor Baker's words met with frequent cheers. He said he was pleased to read what President Upton of the congress said in The Oregonian yesterday to the effect that radicals and radicalism must go. In responding to the mayor's address, the welcome Mr. Upton gave him much credit for assisting in putting through favorable irrigation legislation.

Attorney-General Brown, who followed closely after Mayor Baker's address, emphasized the fact that reclamation projects are constructive methods of meeting conditions such as are all too abundant throughout the country today. He pointed out the value of irrigation and drainage districts to the country and showed that when men are busily engaged in constructive work they lose the desire to revolutionize everything and become happy in that they are doing to help in the general cause of bringing about better conditions.

Brown backs Legion's plan. Mr. Brown took a decisive stand for greater progress in reclamation work and against the proposed leasing of upper Klamath lake to the California-Oregon Power company without providing certain acres for service man, as asked by the American Legion.

Following Mr. Brown's address came one by D. C. Henny, consulting engineer of the United States reclamation service, on the work of that service in Oregon. The Salt Lake irrigation conference, held at Lakeview, purpose and plan was next discussed by J. T. Hinkle of Hermiston and Professor W. L. Powers of Oregon Agricultural college. Professor H. D. Scudder of the same institution was to have taken part in this, but was detained at home by illness, as was also Harry W. Ward of Madras.

Percy Cupper, state engineer, who is on his way with regard to reclamation matters, was called upon and spoke briefly on the value and importance of irrigation and drainage.

"This state is making fine progress in reclamation work," said Mr. Cupper, "but it should be better. We have what I consider the finest machinery created by the legislature that any state has, but it is not being run to maximum capacity. It needs speeding up. We now have about 1,000,000 acres under irrigation. There are 50 districts and of these 16 have been bonded."

Portland Singled Out.

Mr. Cupper called attention to Portland's situation with regard to reclamation, saying it has about 10 many acres from which could be made excellent manufacturing sites, through the process of drainage.

"It has been said too long that Portland is not a business city," said Mr. Cupper, "but I say it is directly interested, and I hope its business men will see the great advantage to be gained by proper use of our splendid legislation."

At the morning session, the principal business was the reports of President Upton and Secretary Wallace, and registering of delegates. H. B. Duxer, president of the Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the delegates on behalf of that organization, and O. C. Letter detailed the work of the congress to date.

President Upton appointed two committees as follows: On resolutions, R. E. Bradbury of Klamath Falls; P. J. Gallagher of Ontario; Fred N. Wallace of Tumalo; C. C. Clark of Astoria; George Quayle of Portland; George H. Russell of Prineville and Jon McAllister of Salem; on credentials, Mayor James Kyle of Stanfield; C. T. Darley of Klamath Falls; H. H. De Armond of Bend, and Walter Hinkle of Prineville.

It is anticipated that the congress will, late this afternoon, give unanimous and enthusiastic endorsement to the John Day district project, the largest now before the state for opening and which involves 30,000 acres. Action will also be taken, if time is sufficient, with regard to the upper Klamath lake controversy.

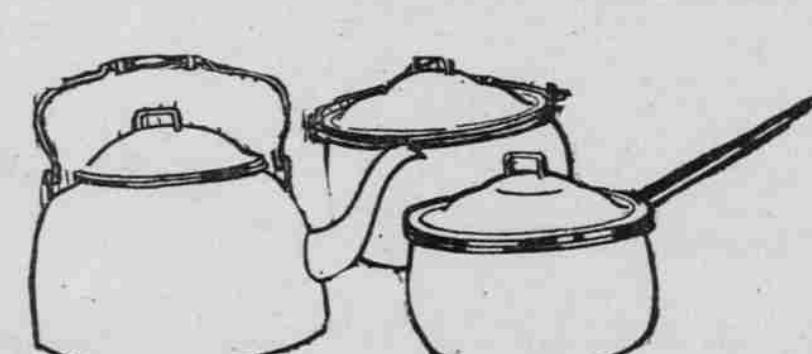

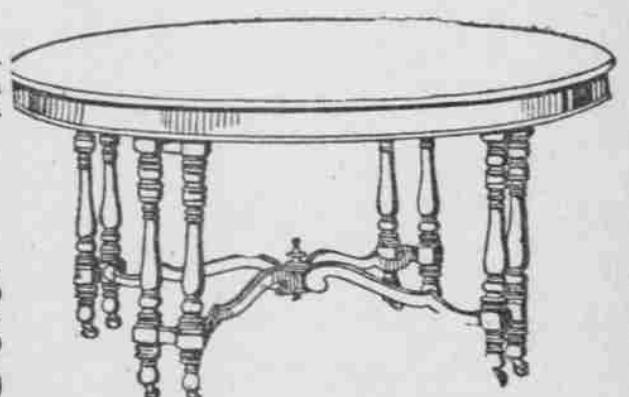

JEFFERSON MEMORIAL UP

400 STUDENTS WHO SERVED COLORS TO BE HONORED.

Art Advisory Committee Will Decide Next Week Upon Nature of Monument.

In honor of the 400 or more students from Jefferson high school who saw service in the army, navy or marines, or who lost their lives in France, the school is to erect a bronze memorial. It is planned to have a tablet or monument something distinctive in its class.

The art advisory committee of the schools, to whom such matters are referred, paid a visit to Jefferson yesterday and inspected locations for a memorial. It was suggested by E. A. Doyle, local architect, that a flag pole having an octagonal base of bronze be erected. On the faces of the standard could be engraved names of the boys. Should a memorial be placed within the building, it probably will be in the form of a tablet. A committee is to decide definitely upon it next week.

COLLEGE ORATORS READY

TRIANGULAR DEBATE TONIGHT BETWEEN OREGON COLLEGES.

U. of O. Team to Meet Local Arguers on Immigration Question at Reed Chapel.

A revival of intercollegiate debating, with Reed college, the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college in the competing roles, will take place tonight at the three institutions. The negative team from the university, composed of Remy Sox of Portland and Ernest Crockett of Spokane, will be met at Reed this evening by Herbert Swett and Lewis Jones, Reed men upholding the affirmative side of a phase of the immigration question.

Judges for the Reed debate, which will be held in the college chapel this evening at 8 o'clock, are ex-Judge Wallace McCann of the Oregon supreme court, Hopkin Jenkins, principal of Jefferson high, and Bishop W. T. Sumner. The debate is open to the public free of admission.

Jury Convicts Convict.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 8.—(Special.)—D. Stevens, convict in the state penitentiary, was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a jury in superior court today. The jury recommended life imprisonment. Stevens killed Ivan McClellan, Spokane county convict, with a pair of scissors during a fight at the prison in October. The jury was out all night.
