EX-POLICEMAN TO FACE JURY TODAY.

The case of Charles W. Beaver, former Portland policeman, who has been charged with a statutory offense on evidence furnished by 14-year-old Evelyn Mack, will go before the grand jury today, according to announcement made yesterday by Deputy District Attorney Deich. After Beaver was held to answer to the grand jury by Municipal Judge Rossmann Saturday, District Attorney Evans and Deputy District Attorney Nowry held a conference with Deputy District Attorney Deich, and plans were laid for placing the case immediately before the grand jury.

WOMAN, 72, FOUND DEAD.

Mrs. Mary E. Savage, 72, was found dead in her home at 614 East Fourth street northeast yesterday morning by members of the family. Mrs. Savage had been living alone at that address for some time. Two sons, R. Savage and P. P. Savage, are living in the city with their families. Some member of the family was accustomed to call each day, and when they called yesterday morning they found Mrs. Savage dead. The body was turned over to Deputy Coroner Leo Gotsch, who is investigating the cause of death. He said last night that it was probably pneumonia.

PERSHING ONCE PUNISHED

C. E. COLLINS.

Little Portland Girl, Whose Father

Died Overseas, to Present Bouquet at Auditorium.

When General Pershing arrives

in Portland next Sunday he will meet again the man who was his orderly on the day he was advanced from a captain of the 15th cavalry to General Wood's staff in the Philippines. This man is C. E. Collins of 405 Tenth street, who served in troop D of the same regiment in 1901 and 1902. So far as Mr. Collins knows, he is the only ex-soldier in the state who was with Pershing during the Moro campaign.

The Portland man has very painful

memories of one of his personal encounters with the general, who has always been extremely strict about enforcing military orders. One morning, Mr. Collins says, the troop was marching from the stables in column of fours when a Spanish woman on the second floor of a building called Collins by name and shouted, "Good morning!" in Spanish. Collins thought his captain had left the troop, and, contrary to military etiquette, which forbids speaking while at attention, he answered the woman.

Almost immediately the entire

troop was halted and Captain Pershing stepped out from where he had been marching just in the rear of Collins. He placed Collins under arrest and sentenced him to four days' employment in the public park, where he was to pick up cigarette butts. Collins, however, was not so easily intimidated. He remitted the sentence to four hours, but in the meantime the young man had put in a painful morning while fellow soldiers stood around watching his antics in the park.

General Pershing, accompanied by

his staff and others of the official party, is to arrive in Portland, at Union station, at 12:30 o'clock Sunday, where he will be met by special reception committees from the Chamber of Commerce and the American Legion.

Leaving Portland at 11:30 Sunday

night, General Pershing will proceed to Seattle and Camp Lewis. He will pass through this city again on January 21 on his way to California.

Some little girl, three or four years

old, whose father died "over there," is to have the privilege of presenting a bouquet of Japanese roses to General Pershing, on behalf of the American Legion, at the auditorium assembly. Candidates for the honor should be listed with James Conville, Liberty temple, Main 313, where the selection will be made.

Franklin School Acclaims Prohibition Orator.

PRIZE WINNER IS MODEST

Victor in Des Moines, Ia., Contest Gives Credit to Instructor. Men Competitors Beaten.

Here's a copy of The Oregonian

with a story in it about an Oregon girl who won first prize in a prohibition oratorical contest," said a man on a Union Pacific train passing through Wyoming last Thursday, as he handed the copy to Miss Margaret Garrison. "It may interest you."

Although he did not then and does

not now know it, Miss Garrison was "the girl." She was returning home from Des Moines, Iowa, where she had just won first prize and the \$100 award in the biennial national oratorical contest of the Inter-Collegiate Prohibition association, being the first of her sex ever to win this honor. She spoke against six men from various sections of the country.

Miss Garrison reached Portland Friday

and was met at the Union station by a large delegation of teachers and students of the Franklin high school, where she teaches English and public speaking. She was showered with flowers and was otherwise received with joyous acclaim by her associates and the pupils and special recognition at Franklin is to be accorded her Tuesday afternoon, when an assembly will be held and public honor given.

If her experiences at Des Moines,

Miss Garrison is rather reticent. Of one thing she is sure—that, in the confusion and hurry of things, she did not learn the markings of the judges and therefore she does not yet know upon what basis the prize was awarded her. She hopes to ascertain this soon, however.

Letter Commends Winner.

Miss Garrison's victory has brought forth a commendatory letter from Elton G. Borton, publicity secretary of the Inter-Collegiate Prohibition association.

"Speaking against six men, who,

like herself, had battled through the local, state and interstate contests and won supremacy over some 1500 other collegiate orators, Miss Garrison walked away with the first honors and the prize of \$100," wrote Mr. Borton.

Miss Garrison was loath to speak

of her hopes for the future when asked concerning her plans, but said that her ambition inclines rather toward the dramatic than the oratorical and that she has some ideas of her own which she wishes to work out, if possible.

According to Miss Garrison, she

owes a large share of the credit for her honors to her instructor, Mrs. Helen Miller Senn, now on the staff of the University of Oregon and formerly instructor in oratory at Willamette university, where she discovered her pupil.

Credit Given Mrs. Senn.

"Mrs. Senn is a wonderful instructor," volunteered Miss Garrison, "and I certainly wish her to have all possible credit for what she did in my case. Without her assistance and direction, it would have been impossible for me to have won."

The title of Miss Garrison's oration

was "A New Reconstruction." She is the third of Mrs. Senn's pupils to have achieved honor in prohibition association contests. The other two were men. She was chosen by Mrs. Senn at Willamette university as the best available material for the purpose in 1917 and has since received continuous instruction. At that time she had no training in this line. Since Miss Garrison came to Portland to take a position in the public schools, she has been under Mrs. Senn's instruction continually up to the time of leaving for Des Moines.
