INSPECTOR TO VISIT HILL ACADEMY—Lieutenant-Colonel S. A. Howard, U. S. A., inspector of the 12th district, will be in Portland today to inspect Hill Military academy as a unit of the reserve officers training college. Colonel W. H. C. Bowen, commandant of the academy, will receive the visiting officer. A part of the equipment sent by the government has arrived and a new addition to the armory is being built and repairs made to the school. A handsome new flag was presented to the academy yesterday by Dr. E. Hamilton Street, a graduate of Hill Military academy, who organized an ambulance company and drilled the unit there. Dr. Street recently returned from Letterman hospital where he was in charge of surgical work and ranked as captain.

AMUSEMENTS TO HONOR ENCORES—The Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects were hosts for a luncheon at the Benson hotel, yesterday, in honor of Charles Harris Whitaker, editor of the Journal of the American Institute of Architects, who was a leader in the war housing legislation and since the war was sent to England to study housing conditions there. Today the Oregon chapter will take Mr. Whitaker up the Columbia river highway, with luncheon at Chanticleer inn. Mr. Whitaker will be guest of honor at a dinner at the University club this evening, when the Portland Architects' club will be hosts. Covers will be placed for 75. David Beasley Campbell will give a short piano recital.

CHILDREN'S COATS WANTED—An urgent plea for children's coats is made by Mrs. S. M. Blumauer, representing the Junior Red Cross. The coats are for the children of Siberia who are destitute. Tacoma received the appeal and answered by giving \$1000. This is a hurry-up call and one that needs immediate response, says Mrs. Blumauer. On Russian Island there are 760 forlorn little ones ranging in age from 6 to 16 years. The Red Cross has taken charge of them and it is their appeal that Portland is asked to head. All coats may be sent to 367 Glass building. The coats that will take them will sail Friday from Seattle, so this is a matter that calls for prompt action.

BROOKS ADMITS PLEADING GUILTY—Testimony concerning a prior plea of guilty and sentence by the municipal court was admitted in the prosecution of Lawrence T. Brooks on a statutory charge by Circuit Judge Kavanagh yesterday. Brooks was fined \$500 and sentenced to six months in jail on the same charge under city ordinances when he pleaded guilty before Judge Rossmann some months ago. He was paroled several months later. The grand jury investigation and indictment were said to have followed the petitioning of scores of his neighbors in Brentwood. He is accused of making advances to his 8-year-old daughter, Elizabeth.

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PERSHING WILL GET NO GREAT PARADE

Quiet Reception Is Planned for General in Portland.

MINISTERS FILE PROTEST

Plans of Committee Calling for Military Escort Only Please Presbyterian Pastors.

Receipt of a communication from the Presbyterian ministers of the city, submitting "in a kindly spirit" a suggestion that there be no parade next Sunday on the occasion of the visit of General John J. Pershing, yesterday brought forth the fact that the committee in charge, of which Judge Chalmers is chairman, had decided to revise the original plan and instead have only a military escort for the distinguished guest. It was formerly intended to have a more elaborate reception, but because of its being Sunday a change was made.

Dr. D. A. Thompson, pastor of the Mizpah Presbyterian church, is chairman of a committee named by the ministers of that denomination yesterday morning to seek a minimum of display upon the visit of General Pershing because he is to be here Sunday. Dr. Thompson was for 19 months in the overseas Y. M. C. A. work, being stationed at Bordeaux, France, and upon being informed of the revised plans expressed entire satisfaction.

"Knowing the requirements of military etiquette," said Dr. Thompson, "I should say that nothing short of what the Chamber of Commerce committee has decided upon as an escort for our distinguished visitor would be fitting the dignity of his rank and of the occasion. Our committee is of the opinion that the community can in no way find offense in such an arrangement as has been made and that anything less would fall short of the military honor that must be paid to General Pershing. We had thought an elaborate parade was contemplated."

"The Chamber of Commerce committee members took cognizance of the fact that General Pershing's visit to Portland falls upon Sunday," said Judge Carey. "We were regretful that did, but as it cannot be otherwise, we gave careful consideration to the plans for his reception and entertainment while here and some time ago decided to eliminate all unnecessary military features, including a big parade. Our present plans call only for a military escort showing of honor to our guest."

Judge Carey added that General Pershing has been asked to appear at the White Temple, Twelfth and Taylor streets, Sunday night to start a movement here for aid to the starving peoples of the near east. It is not yet known whether he will be able to do so.

Military Escort Provided.

The revised plans for General Pershing's visit, insofar as the parade is concerned, will be as follows: He will be escorted from the Union station by the veterans of the Portland bureau of police, followed by four government automobiles; the Red Cross canteen band; a battalion of three companies, Oregon national guard; General Pershing's automobile, in which will be Governor Olcott of Oregon, Mayor Baker of Portland and one aide; followed by 10 members of the general's staff; the Chamber of Commerce committee, officers of the army and navy and representatives of the G. A. R. American Legion, Spanish War veterans and veterans of foreign wars.

The communication which was sent to the Chamber of Commerce committee by the Presbyterian ministers is as follows:

"The Presbyterian Ministers' association of Portland share in the desire of our people to give General Pershing a warm and hearty welcome on the occasion of his visit to the city next Sunday. We realize that the great mistake to be held next Sunday will be an emphasis of wholesome character, in view of the fact that Sunday is a day of rest and that the city is a place of worship and that such a demonstration as the proposed parade might be omitted next Sunday."

Reference of the claim of \$75,000 made by J. P. Kelly and N. A. Shannon, boardman of the Federalson, who constructed the public auditorium, to a board of arbitration is the demand of the city council upon the city council.

According to Mr. Dunlavy, the contract between the city and Mr. Federalson specified that all differences arising from the construction of the building should be submitted to a board of arbitration, and this will be demanded by the bondsmen.

Most of the members of the city council have contended that the city has no legal right to pay the claims, even though the city may be morally obligated to do so. Several weeks ago the entire matter was referred to a committee of business men, and this committee recommended the appointment of a committee of competent men to determine the amount due from the city to the bondsmen.

JOE MIELKE LOSES POINT

Judge Stapleton Rules Out Plea of Former Jeopardy.

On the ground that the city of Portland, having no authority either to define or punish involuntary manslaughter, could not place Joe Mielke again in jeopardy for that offense regardless of the wording of a complaint, Circuit Judge Stapleton yesterday allowed the motion of Deputy City Attorney Myers and Lansing, to strike out the plea of former jeopardy made for Mielke by Attorney Tom Garland.

Garland contended that Mielke was being subjected to prosecution against the involuntary manslaughter.

MALHEUR CASE REFERRED

State Water Board to Decide Owyhee Injunction Action.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 12. (Special.)—The case brought in the county court of Malheur county by the Owyhee Ditch company to enjoin Fred Klingback, Claus Martinson et al. from interfering with or using the waters of Owyhee river has been referred to the state water board for final determination, according to letters received here today. Request is made by the court, according to the papers received by the state water board, that all other persons using water from the river be made to appear in the action.

In the action brought by the ditch corporation damages in the sum of \$5000, in addition to a permanent injunction, are sought from the plain-tiffs.

SLANDER SUIT DROPPED

Portland Times Agrees to Apologize to Mrs. Cannady.

Complete retraction of charges made in an editorial published in the Portland Times against Mrs. Beatrice Cannady, associate editor of the Portland Advocate, was made yesterday in a statement signed by J. A. Merriman, editor of the Times.

Both publications involved in the controversy are published in the interest of the negro population of Portland. The editorials in which Mrs. Cannady's reputation and character were questioned resulted in an indictment by the grand jury and the filing of a complaint against the Times in the civil courts by Mrs. Cannady. The indictment was dismissed.
