

FARREN LANDS HERE TO FIGHT MORTON

John Flammer Brings Protege From South.

BOUT TO BE TOMORROW

Lightweight Is Reported to Be in Excellent Condition and Weighing About 135.

John Flammer, well-known San Francisco sportsman and manager of boxers, arrived from the Golden Gate city yesterday with Frankie Farren, his lightweight protege. Farren will fight ten rounds against "Puggy" Morton of Los Angeles in the semi-windup of tomorrow night's fight card at the Heilig theater.

Flammer reports his boy in fine condition and added that Farren is still making 135 pounds for any of them. It developed that Morton ought to make 125 pounds for Farren so both can be listed as legitimate lightweights if they make the weight.

Flammer was in excellent humor, as the train was on time from California. When not relating what a promising boxer Farren was becoming he was telling a lot of interesting San Francisco gossip.

Flammer took over the management of Farren after the latter took the count at the hands of Willie Jackson, the New York lightweight. Farren held his own in the first round, but in a return match clipped Frankie on the chin in the early minutes of the battle and the contest had to be stopped to save him from further punishment in the fourth canto.

It took Farren a long time to get over the defeat, but under the guidance of Flammer has once more rounded into his old-time form. Of late he has been working hard, his opponents as before his little tiff with Jackson. Jimmy Duffy won a four-round decision over Farren in Oakland last Wednesday night, but Duffy is liable to win a four-round call over Henry Leonard if he is right. In four rounds Duffy is as good as defeated the champion himself. Farren has a return match coming up with Duffy in a week or so and hopes to reverse the verdict.

Morton is as little known here as Farren is known. He comes with a good reputation, however, and Flammer, who has seen him box in the south, says that he is a good boy. Morton is back on the coast fresh from a successful eastern and middle west invasion, and stopped off on his way home to Los Angeles. He has been training here for two weeks and is bubbling over with confidence as to his ability to trim Farren.

Johnny McCarthy and Alex Trambitas, who will battle ten rounds in the main event in an endeavor to help fathom the waterweight championship question of the Pacific coast, wound up their training ticks yesterday. Both contestants will take things easy today and rest up for the ten-round grind tomorrow night.

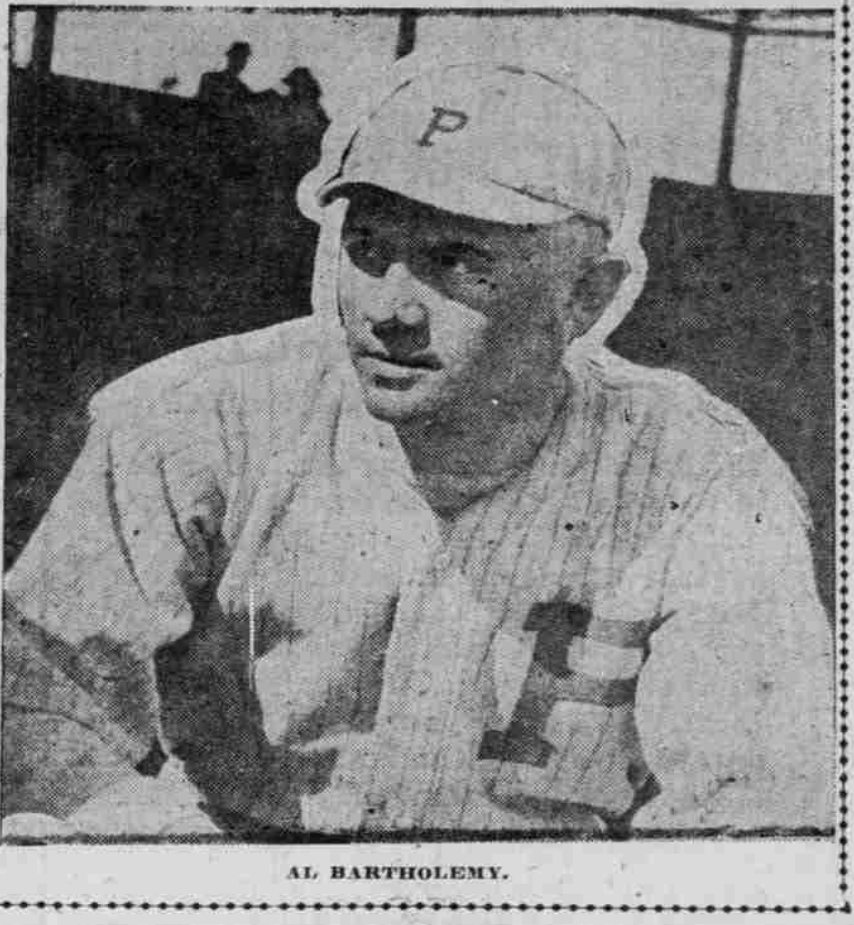
After his shower and rubdown yesterday McCarthy said that he never felt better in his life and is ready for his clever young opponent.

Trambitas has the bout of his young career on hand and if he can defeat the veteran in the ten-round bout, he will have established himself pretty strongly with the fans all along the coast.

Dundee will box Bobby Harper six two-minute rounds in Seattle, while Dundee will tackle Jim Storey in the semi-windup. Dundee is not likely to get hurt scuffling Harper, but Denny may get some bruises from Storey, who is a brawler.

RALLY DEFEATS DARCY

BATTLING ORTEGA STAGES A 'COMEBACK' IN 10TH ROUND.

Oregonian's Slight Advantage in Rounds Is Offset by Other's Effective Punching.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Battling Ortega of Oakland staged a ten-round rally before a crowd of 4200 fans at the Oregon building tonight that won for him the decision over Jimmy Darcy of Portland. When the tenth round started it appeared that Ortega would be battling for as good as an even break. But the Oaklander not only stemmed the tide of defeat, but turned a possible loss into a remarkable victory.

Though a tab of the rounds would indicate that the Oregonian had a slight advantage, when you stop to think of the fact that Ortega was fighting on his feet, while Darcy was tottering, the result is not surprising. One punch from Ortega sent Darcy staggering on when he was downed, and the other sent him to the ropes and as the going sounded the batter was mummeling in rights and lefts to the body. It was a sensational finish to a great battle.

Darcy was doing good work in that he kept up a steady attack, and had he kept up the good work he might have won. Ortega, fighting desperately, took the fight away from his opponent. He sailed in with more speed than he had previously exhibited and scored a knockdown on when he was downed.

The course was laid out from Versailles to the Bois de Boulogne and Guillemot ran the distance in better time than the railroad trains average between Paris and Versailles.

Hershell L. Driver, Portland, Gets Mrs. Hoover Fellowship.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Jan. 12.—Two fellowships of \$600 a year each for two years have been founded at Stanford, one by Theodore J. Hoover, brother of Herbert C. Hoover, former federal food administrator, and the other by Mrs. Herbert Hoover.

The fellowship founded by Hoover has been conferred upon Aubrey A. Curtice of Spokane, Wash., and that founded by Mrs. Hoover has been awarded to Hershell L. Driver of Portland, Or. Both have received undergraduate degrees and are beginning two years' study to gain masters degrees in engineering.
