

LET PEOPLE DECIDE ISSUE--JOHNSON

California Senator Accepts
Wilson Challenge.

CANDIDATE SEES DANGER

Treaty With Reservations Advo-
cated, but Peril Sighted in
Suppression of Speech.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California declared in an address in Brooklyn tonight that he would accept the challenge of President Wilson to take the ratification of the peace treaty to the people. "I don't care whether republican leaders accept the wage of battle or not," he said. "For one, I accept the issue, and I shall go to the people. A subject which deals so intimately with the treasure and blood of the average American is a subject upon which he has the right to ultimate decision. Politicians on one side or the other may seek to avoid this issue, but I say with all solemnity, if the politicians unite with absolute unanimity in hindering this subject and endeavoring to prevent its discussion, the American people will wrest it from the politicians and themselves decide it."

After reiterating his advocacy of the treaty with reservations, Senator Johnson warned against suppression of free speech and right of assembly. Every infringement of the law should be drastically punished, he said, and no endeavor to overturn the government by force or violence could be tolerated. "But the difficulty in some quarters appears to be a certain vagueness as to what constitutes law and order."

Senator Sights Danger.

"There is real danger," he asserted, "that in our just anger against those who advocate or justify crimes of violence, we may be led by reactionary politicians or newspapermen, who are wearing the livery of patriotism, or by our own zeal into extravagant suppression which will imperil the very foundation of the republic, the fundamental American principles of free speech and free assembly."

"There are those today," he continued, "who, lashing themselves into fury against men holding opinions contrary to theirs, would suppress legitimate expression, and, on the other hand, there are those who preach sedition and would destroy all human initiative and confiscate the fruits of human endeavor. The danger is real, indeed that of the republican party, is to prevent the consummation of either of these designs, and to proceed on our way between reaction on the one hand and ultra-radicalism on the other."

"The preacher of violence and the public advocate of the bomb and the torch must be drastically dealt with under the law and by the law's procedure punished for its violation. But the right of any citizen within the law to express his views and beliefs is as sacred as the right of property itself, and must be as zealously guarded. The reaction which would prevent legitimate free speech, which would make government the mentor of men's honest opinions, spells in its own mind the end of the republic."

Plea Made for Socialists.
"In a free country," he continued, "men and women may agitate for such political reforms and changes as they see fit; but they must confine their agitation to lawful means and stay within the constitution. When, however, men within the constitution, agitate for social or political change, elect representatives to a legislative body, all Americans, although they may be as far apart as the poles from the political ideas expressed, must demand that the constitution be obeyed and respected and the representatives thus elected by the minority acting within the law and the constitution, must be protected. If you can exclude socialists in New York today, tomorrow you may exclude republicans in Mississippi and democrats in Pennsylvania."

"We can only continue as a republic by free public opinion. Censorship and governmental propaganda first curtail and limit freedom and then destroy it. We have been picking our pockets to poison our minds. In the last few years we have been financing from taxpayers millions of money for governmental propaganda, not to disseminate information, but to hide defeat and deficiencies and to praise what was not always praised. If any group, even a governmental group, has the right with public funds to feed misinformation to people, the shackling of freedom is not far distant."

NEW ERA FOR WORLD SEEN

PRESIDENT ISSUES CALL FOR
LEAGUE OF NATIONS COUNCIL.

Cablegrams Sent to Great Britain,
France, Italy, Japan, Brazil,
Belgium and Spain.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Assembly of the council of the League of Nations in Paris next Friday will mark the beginning of a new era in international co-operation and the first great step towards the ideal concert of nations. President Wilson declared in his message to the meeting, as provided by the treaty of Versailles. The text of the call was made public tonight.

"It will bring the League of Nations into being as a living force, devoted to the task of assisting the peoples of all countries in their desire for peace, prosperity and happiness," the cablegram, addressed to Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Brazil, Belgium and Spain, said. "The president is convinced that its progress will accord with the noble purpose to which it is dedicated."

President Wilson's message was transmitted by the state department to United States embassies in all countries named for formal presentation to these governments. It was the same in each case, with the exception of the address, and the full text of the call sent to London follows:

"In compliance with article 5 of the covenant of the League of Nations which went into effect at the same time as the treaty of Versailles of June 28, 1919, of which it is a part, the president of the United States, acting on behalf of those nations which have deposited their instruments of ratification in Paris as certified in a process verbal drawn up by the French government dated January 10, 1920, has the honor to inform the government of Great Britain that the first meeting of the council of the League of Nations will be held in Paris at the ministry of foreign af-

fairs on Friday, January 16, at 10:30 A. M.

"The president earnestly ventures the hope that the government of Great Britain will be in a position to send a representative to this first meeting. He feels that it is unnecessary for him to point out the deep significance attached to this meeting or the importance which it must assume in the eyes of the world."

"It will mark the beginning of a new era in international co-operation and the first great step towards the ideal concert of nations. It will bring the league of nations into being as a living force, devoted to the task of assisting the peoples of all countries in their desire for peace, prosperity and happiness. The president is convinced that its progress will accord with the noble purpose to which it is dedicated."

Germany, in compensation for the destruction of the surrendered warships, is requested to deliver to the allies certain inland steamers and harbor facilities, such as floating docks and tugs, and the council has decided to allocate 2 per cent of this material to the United States. Ambassador Wallace today informed the council that if its decision with respect to the award was final, the United States would waive its claim to any part of the indemnity.
