REED EX-SERVICE MEN GET FUNDS.
 Over \$5000 will be given to Reed college ex-service men during the college year by the State of Oregon, under the provisions of the educational-aid bill for soldiers, sailors and marines, voted by the people. The money first became available yesterday when the state paid the monthly service accounts of 45 Oregon ex-service men at Reed. Two applicants, \$1115.53 for October and \$1135.25 for November. Of the 45 men, 27 saw overseas service and several bear wound stripes. The freshman class has the largest representation, with 24 ex-fighters from Oregon.
