

PRESIDENT REPORTED AGAINST HITCHCOCK

Wilson Said to Support Underwood for Leader.

CONTEST TO END TODAY

Peace Treaty Stands Aside as Senators Battle at Short Range Over Selection of Spokesman.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The peace treaty had to stand aside today to permit the 46 democratic senators to battle at short range over the selection of a minority leader. The contest will be settled tomorrow by the election of either Gilbert M. Hitchcock of Nebraska or Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama to command the democratic forces. The race was as close today as it could be, and it is not yet clear what will happen. The Hitchcock partisans appeared the most confident. An unexpected development, however, is that the White House appears to have turned against its old spokesman and champion of the peace treaty, Secretary Tamm. At the beginning of the fight it was understood that the White House was helping Hitchcock because he had defended the president's position all the time, while Underwood had sought a compromise ratification. It now develops that Secretary Tamm is bringing pressure to bear on senators to line them up for Underwood.

Wilson Through With Leader.
The only explanation of this, at least the only one heard, is that Mr. Wilson is through with Senator Hitchcock, having used him through the long fight, and is ready to restore the status quo ante.

It will be recalled that never until the beginning of treaty negotiations were the president and Senator Hitchcock in perfect agreement on any question. Hitchcock, who has numerous Wilson appointments and opposed many administration measures. An unfriendly feeling existed between both seemed to feel proud. If Hitchcock is defeated tomorrow the blame will be placed on the White House by the Nebraska senator's friends and the disturbed relations heretofore mentioned will be resumed.

Hitchcock's friends were quite as much surprised as outsiders to discover that Secretary Tamm was helping the Underwood side, which, of course, meant to them that the president had given consent, if not the command, to interfere in the fight.

Reservations Add Strength.

The compromise on the treaty still hangs on the reservation to article 10 of the league of nations covenant. The republican side has decided to make no modification that is a change in substance of the reservation. Several republican senators, who originally favored only reservations as a means of uniting all the diverse groups in the senate, have finally become reservationists at heart. Like President Lowell of Harvard, who was originally favorable to ratifying the treaty without reservations if possible, they now declare reservations to be vitally necessary. There has been a constant breaking down of the opposition to reservations, and strong ones among democratic senators. Judge McCourt Insists on Sticking to Constitutional Attack.

"The law is unconstitutional and foolish," complained Attorney Otto J.

Kramer, referring to the state dog tax law in arguing a demurrer before Judge McCourt yesterday morning to a suit to knock out the statute.

"The question of foolishness is not before the court," commented Judge McCourt. "The legislature can be constitutionally foolish as well as constitutionally wise."

District Attorney Evans expressed the view that he found himself in a peculiar position in being forced to defend a law which he wished to see declared invalid and believed was unconstitutional.

Judge McCourt asked that briefs be submitted by both sides on the demurrer.

The action was that brought by Walter B. Honeyman against law-enforcing officers of the state to prevent the carrying out of the requirements of the dog tax law.

42 KILLED, 105 WURT IN BERLIN RIOTING

Quiet Is Established; Streets Heavily Guarded.

TRIBUTE PAID TO POLICE

People Urged Not to Be Misled by Criminal Element—Work Held Germany's Only Hope.

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Cabinet Pleads for Order.
The cabinet of the national government, together with the Prussian cabinet, has issued a statement in which the members declare unanimously for the maintenance of order by all means available.

BERLIN, Jan. 14.—The socialist democratic party has issued an appeal to its members not to allow themselves to be provoked by independent and communist "wire pullers," who are "directly responsible for the bloodshed and want to continue playing an unscrupulous game with human lives."

The appeal asks whether the workers will permit national representation to be placed under terrorism, and tells them that the German nation can be saved from complete destruction only by work.

Conservative Citizens Roused.
Conservative citizens of Berlin call for government measures to prevent further riots, especially those dreaded in the Reichstag building, which was destroyed on Thursday of the anniversary of the death of Dr. Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg.

Vorwärts editorially declares that, according to all reports, the police showed the utmost patience in the rioting of Tuesday and did not fire until ten policemen had been severely wounded. It points out that Dr. Heine, Prussian minister of the interior, and Chief of Police Ernst personally controlled the police and adds that neither the government nor its organs were responsible for the bloodshed.

The aim of the criminal elements, however, it says, "was achieved and the workers were stirred by the bloodshed. The responsibility will be on the heads of those who senselessly led innocent people into danger of destruction."

LONDON, Jan. 14.—A Berlin wireless dispatch under date of Wednesday says that Dr. Karl Heine, Prussian minister of the interior, speaking in the assembly today on Tuesday's rioting, said that the police had been successful in maintaining order and that the rioting was a result of the actions of the independent and communist "wire pullers," who are "directly responsible for the bloodshed and want to continue playing an unscrupulous game with human lives."

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Chancellor Thanks Police.
Chancellor Bauer said: "I regret it is my duty to express in the name of the government my thanks to the 'safety police.' They have done their duty bravely and have been attacked by criminal elements in the crowd and brutally maltreated and killed with their own arms. Signals were given to storm the Reichstag building by the independent wavering handkerchiefs. Had the mob succeeded in entering the building a second St. Bartholomew's night would have ensued."

W. W. ARGUMENTS HEARD

STATE RESTS CASE AT TRIAL OF HENNESSY AT VANCOUVER.

Attorney Vanderveer Opens Defense, Then Goes to Minnehaha for His Own Hearing.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—In the I. W. W. case against Mike Hennessy, the state rested today at 2:30 o'clock, and the defense began. George F. Vanderveer, attorney for I. W. W. throughout the state, is in charge.

Mr. Vanderveer gave a short history of his client and did not dispute that he is a member of the I. W. W. He read the complaint and detailed each and every allegation in its entirety. Hennessy, he said, had not acted in the commission of the crime charged. He began a discussion of the I. W. W. organization when P. J. Kirwin, special prosecutor, objected, being sustained by Judge Back, who is trying the case.

Vanderveer made the statement that there are a number of rights and wrongs that cannot be settled by jails. Mr. Kirwin objected, was sustained and Mr. Vanderveer attempted to argue with the court. Judge Back ruled that it was not a question of right or wrong being decided, but a question of whether the defendant was guilty as charged.

After an objection by Mr. Kirwin, Mr. Vanderveer attempted to read some literature and Mr. Kirwin again objected. Mr. Vanderveer addressed the court: "I have any way to secure an uninterrupted moment for reading this. He read 'Mass Action,' 'The Onward Sweep of Bolshevism,' 'Organizing the New Social System,' 'Attitude of I. W. W. to Law.'"

Mr. Vanderveer left for his own trial to be held at 5 o'clock at Minnehaha. He is charged with unlawfully talking to prisoners through the bars at the county jail.

RATE FINDINGS ARRIVE

COPIES OF EXAMINER'S REPORT REACH PORTLAND.

Statement to Commission Covers 40 Typewritten Pages and Also Contains Map of Territory.

Copies of the report of Henry A. Thurtell, chief examiner of the interstate commerce commission, on the Portland rate case were received. It consists of 40 typewritten pages and an accompanying blue-print map of the territory embraced in the controversy.

In reviewing the situation with regard to the territory lying north of the Snake river and south of the line of the Chicago and Great Northern railroad, the examiner says:

"If it could be concluded it was unjustly preferential for the Northern Pacific and Oregon-Washington to maintain through rates from points in this territory to Seattle which are the same rates applied via the Puget Sound route, this territory would not be included, as to the combination of local and proportional rates made via the Milwaukee route, it does not appear that the difference in operating conditions of the roads serving this territory over the road serving Seattle is to justify finding of prejudice in maintenance of this equality of rates."

It is set out in the report that the difference in distance alone in fruit loads over the lines serving that territory is not relatively great in that territory.

The examiner suggests that a combination of the local and proportional rates in the movement of this traffic which seem to be implied in the paragraph appears to be a unique feature on this point.
