CENSUS WORK NEARING END.—Finishing touches are being put upon the taking of the federal census by W. D. Bennett, supervisor for this district, and his staff of operatives. Mr. Bennett issued an appeal last night for any who have not been enumerated as yet to get into touch with his office in the Penton building or with the Chamber of Commerce, telephone Broadway 440. "We are making a final clean-up," said Mr. Bennett. "Although the official date for taking the census proper has passed, it is always true that some slip through without being counted. I want all such citizens of Portland to advise us of the fact forthwith. Uncle Sam wants the complete count in every section and we will work it for days, more to be sure we get it for him."

ALLEGED PURSE SNATCHER JAILED.—Sam Johnson, a waiter, was captured last night and charged with stealing a purse containing \$11.15 from Mrs. J. M. Magrum, 229 Hancock street, at East First and Cherry streets. Johnson fled several blocks and hid in a basement where he was discovered by Fred Landy, a driver for the Western Electric company. Mr. Landy turned the prisoner over to Patrolman O'Halloran and Noren. The police say Johnson confessed.

PIONEER WOMAN IS DEAD.—**MRS. MARY E. COLLINS PASSES AT DALLAS HOME.**—Seven Children Survive—Family Came to Oregon From Missouri in 1853.

Mrs. Mary E. Collins, 70, Oregon pioneer of 1853, and widow of the late Judge James L. Collins, died at the family home in Dallas, January 14. Mrs. Collins, whose maiden name was Mary Elizabeth Kimes, was born in De Kalb county, Missouri, in 1849. The Kimes family started to Oregon by ox team in 1853. The father, Lewis Ray Kimes, was drowned while crossing the Missouri river, but the family continued on to Oregon, as all of their relatives were making the journey. The late Henry L. Pittcock and his brother, Robert Pittcock, were members of this emigrant train. Henry L. Pittcock drove the wagon of Mrs. Collins' grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Buckingham. His brother, Robert Pittcock, after ward married Mrs. Collins' aunt, Miss Maria Buckingham.

Arriving in Oregon, the Kimes family settled in Yamhill county. The mother died six years later and Mary was reared to womanhood in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Woods, parents of Governor George L. Woods. She married James L. Collins at Buena Vista, Polk county, in 1867. The young couple began house-keeping in Dallas and lived there the remainder of their lives.

Mrs. Collins was the mother of 10 children, seven of whom survive. The surviving children are: Miss Alma Collins of San Pedro, Calif.; Frank W. Collins of San Francisco; Dean Collins of Portland, Mrs. E. E. Watts of Hillsboro, Mrs. J. U. Nanney of Wilcox, Arizona; Mrs. J. L. Billups of Portland, and Miss Edna Collins of Buena Vista, Oregon. The late Mrs. Collins was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, where Mrs. Collins had worshiped for more than 40 years. The body was taken to Portland for cremation.

FINNISH RADICAL IS HELD.—**MEACHAM FARMER ALLEGED TO BE COMMUNIST.**—Nestor Paananen Arrested by Department of Justice Official on Federal Charge.

Though he prospered in America to such extent that he recently sent \$800 home to Finland, to be held at his order and has been cutting and selling wood at \$10 a cord, Nestor Paananen joined the communist labor party and pledged himself to its revolutionary principles. He was arrested yesterday by Tom Word of the department of justice and is held on federal charges.

Paananen is a Finn, who took out first papers for citizenship seven years ago, but who has made no attempt to complete the course in Americanism. He was arrested at his farm, well stocked and prosperous, which he rents near Meacham. When Paananen's home was entered by federal officers he stoutly denied any affiliation with the communist party. Search of the premises revealed his membership card in the Portland branch of the attempted soviet, together with a receipt for dues paid. The card and communist papers were secreted beneath the cabinet of a high-priced phonograph.

VANCOUVER RENTS SOAR.—Apartment Tenants Receive Notice of \$10 Monthly Increase.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 16.—(Special.)—Rentals of apartments, flats and houses for the past two years in this city have been rather high and rents have been raised from time to time, until was thought that the peak had been reached several months ago. However, another sharp advance has just been made. \$10 per month, effective February 1. The Blaker building at Ninth and Main streets recently changed hands and tenants today received notice by mail that their rents would be \$10 more per month after February 1.

BRIDGE RENTAL REFERRED

J. P. NEWELL ASKED TO PASS ON RAILROAD CLAIM.

Cost of Maintenance and Annual Taxes Added to Total by Union Pacific System.

Though Multnomah county commissioners appeared agreeable to acceding to the request of the Union Pacific system for an additional rental of \$25,548 a year for the upper deck of the Harriman bridge across the Willamette, for which \$48,868 has been paid annually for the past five years, they yesterday submitted to J. P. Newell, engineer, for final investigation into cost to determine whether or not the new rate asked is excessive.

The new figures demanded by the railroad company virtually would require that the county pay not only the 4 1/2 per cent interest on the original investment and yearly depreciation, which total almost the figure which has been paid, but the maintenance and annual taxes in addition.

The investment of the railroad company in the upper decking of this bridge represents approximately \$286,414.45. Four and one-half per cent interest on the investment is estimated at \$14,320.75. Depreciation is figured at \$1513.49. This total is almost that of the \$48,868 which has been paid during the past five years on a lease renewed annually. In asking \$71,416.34 from now on, the railroad company adds the cost of maintenance, \$10,189, and the annual taxes of \$13,755.22.

The lease which must be renewed if the county is to use this bridge, expires next Monday.
