

## McDONALD TRIO SET FREE, THEN JAILED

Spokane Murder Trial Ends With Acquittal.

DEFENDANTS ARE RETAKEN

Forgery and Grand Larceny Charges Filed Against Them for New Suit.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 22.—(Special.)—Pay and Ted McDonald, acquitted in superior court here today of the murder of W. H. McNutt, were held in the county jail at a late hour this evening in default of bail. They were rearrested immediately after their acquittal, Marie and Pay on charges of forgery and Ted on a charge of grand larceny.

It was declared by Attorney C. T. McDonald, their uncle, this afternoon, that \$1000 bonds in the cases of the two women and \$2000 bond in the case of their brother, would be furnished tomorrow for their release.

**Forgery Charge Made.**  
The forgery charges are based on the alleged indorsement with names other than their own of a check which the state sought to have in the murder trial that Marie had presented at a local store for cashing after McNutt's death. It was contended the check had been in McNutt's possession at the time of his death.

Ted McDonald is charged with the theft of an automobile belonging to McNutt and which state witnesses testified the defendant had driven to Roseburg, after McNutt's death, and later to California.

**Body Found Buried.**  
The defendants were charged with having murdered McNutt in a logging house here of which they were joint owners and taking his body to his farm near Scotland, Wash. It was found buried several weeks afterward. They were arrested in California last October and returned here for trial.

Self-defense was urged by the defendants, who testified their brother, Will McDonald, also charged with first degree murder, but never arrested, struck McNutt with a hammer after he had intervened in a quarrel between McNutt and his sister, and the former had drawn a gun and fired several shots. The jury retired late yesterday afternoon.

**MATRIMONIAL AD LURES PAIR ACCUSED OF FRAUDULENT USE OF MAILS.**

Woman Agrees to Wed Michigan Man, Who Sent Various Sums of Money to "Bride."

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 22.—(Special.)—"It does not pay to advertise," is the way A. R. Staly of Jackson, Mich., puts it.

"We're here because we're here," is the noncommittal remark of W. S. Paine and wife, Lucile Rhine, who are accused of using the mails for the furtherance of a fraudulent matrimonial scheme.

Paine and his wife were arrested Wednesday evening by Postal Inspector J. S. Swenson as they were removing a registered letter from postoffice box No. 725 here, and were arraigned before Commissioner R. W. McClelland on a charge of defrauding Staly out of various sums of money through a matrimonial game.

Staly, as witness, read an advertisement in the "Examiner," a matrimonial journal of Kansas City, which described an attractive young lady of 21, and fond of home life, who solicited correspondence from refined gentlemen. The object was matrimony.

Staly wrote to the young lady, who resided at Seattle. The correspondence grew warmer and finally the young lady agreed to marry the Michigan man in Los Angeles. Incidentally, he sent her various sums of money—\$15 at first, then a railroad ticket from Seattle to Los Angeles, and then \$25 for incidental expense.

When the girl wrote that the \$25 had been stolen from her, Staly became suspicious. He wrote to Seattle instead of to Los Angeles.

## YOUNG WIFE SAYS PAST IS FLUNG UP

Divorce From Man Worth \$30,000 or More Is Sought.

WOMAN IS 20, HUSBAND 50

Sponse Who Has Not Bathed Since Wedding in 1916 Named as Cause in Another Case.

Should a woman with a past tell her future husband?

An emphatic negative would be the answer of Mrs. Helene Reynard, if the divorce complaint she filed against Charles W. Reynard in the circuit court yesterday is any indication, for her pre-nuptial confession is the held the direct cause of her unhappy married life.

Mrs. Reynard was less than 20 years of age when she married a man past 50, on November 23, 1916, she sets forth in her divorce papers. Two months before her marriage, she told the man who had asked her to be his wife that she had not always been a good girl, she said. But he said that was in the past, that it was nothing to him and would be forgotten, never again to be referred to, if she would only marry him, asserts Mrs. Reynard's complaint.

Only a few weeks after the wedding, Reynard became angry at his wife, she declares, flung her past in her face in the presence of a younger sister and accused her of still being bad. The early confession was held as a weapon over her head, preventing her from going to amusements and compelling her to obey every order of her husband under constant threat of public exposure, she charges. Customary allowances are asked by Mrs. Reynard of her husband, who is worth, she asserts, between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

From the time of her marriage, August 2, 1916, to Jack Wilson, down to October 27, 1918, when she left him, Cora A. Wilson never took a bath, complained the husband in a divorce action filed yesterday in the office of County Clerk Beveridge.

Wilson is 50 and his wife 45, he asserts. They were wed in Vancouver, Wash.
