

WORK FOR NEW ERA OF GAME LIFE URGED

Louis E. Bean Asks Anglers
to 'Forget Petty Jealousies.'

CO-OPERATION IS OFFERED

Lane County Representative Re-
views Efforts in Behalf of Fish
and Game Development.

In defiance of what he characterized as their unfair and destructive policy, Louis E. Bean, state representative from Lane county, stood up before the members of the Multnomah Anglers' club and pleaded with them to forget their petty jealousies and co-operate with the work of the fish and game commission in order that a new era might be opened up on behalf of the game and fish life of the state.

For more than an hour Mr. Bean sat in the room, hearing indictment after indictment hurled at him by Arthur I. Moulton. He had been characterized as a boss politician; a man who controlled the Oregon legislature, and a man whose political machinations had brought about a condition of chaos in the game and fish life of the state. The speaker, however, members in the room who knew of his presence, but on motion of Dr. Chester C. Moore, Multnomah county representative in the legislature, he was permitted to address the meeting.

"Destructive Policy" Rapped.
"I want to say that if you men spent one-half the time and interest in a constructive policy in fish and game affairs you would do more good than you can ever hope to do under present conditions." Mr. Bean said. "Though I hate to say it, it is true that the officers of your own Multnomah Anglers' club and the officers of the Oregon Sportsmen's league are carrying on this policy of destruction."

Mr. Bean then traced fish and game legislation in the state legislature since he first became a member of that body more than ten years ago. He told them frankly and openly of the controversy over the game farm in Lane county, which is one of the particular objects against which the gun of the anglers' club are trained. "We urged the purchase of that farm in Lane county in order that we might propagate more Chinese pheasants for your Portland sportsmen to hunt when you come down to the valley during the fall, and yet at every step which is taken lawsuits are filed and nothing is left undone to halt this progressive game work," he challenged.

Co-Operation Is Offered.
Mr. Bean told the members that he had been an ardent sportsman all his life; that he had at all times worked for the betterment of the wild life of the state and still wanted to work with the Portland sportsmen if they would only get behind the commission and make an honest effort to bring about better conditions. Despite the indictments of Mr. Moulton, Mr. Bean asserted time after time that he had worked in close cooperation with Will Finley when the latter was state game warden; that many of the laws which the Multnomah anglers are now saying are vicious are laws which were put on the statute books by Mr. Finley when he was game warden. In referring to the recent legislative act creating the new commission, Mr. Bean admitted it probably was not what it should be, but he said that he stood ready to help enact a similar law if by so doing he would retain the present commission.

Frank Warren Lauded.
"I have heard much said here to-night against Frank Warren, whom speakers have alleged controls this commission," Mr. Bean said. "I want to tell you that Frank Warren will go farther than any man among you to see that the game and fish life of the state get a fair and square deal. Look what we are doing at our hatchery down in Lane county, where we have 700,000 rainbow trout ready for distribution. It is Frank Warren's salmon industry which is making this propagation down here possible." Mr. Moulton, law partner of W. P. Lord, attorney for the anglers' club, gave a complete review of the fish and game legislation at the extra session, and asserted it to be unconstitutional. He was particularly bitter in his denunciation of the fish and game commission and of Representative Bean, whom he charged with having secured the legislation. He gave it as his opinion that at the present time the state has no fish and game commission, and he also branded the election of State Senator Gill as a member of the commission as a piece of "foolish and unconstitutional" legislation, although he lauded the ability of Senator Gill.

Stop Autogonism, Is Plea.
"I advise that we get away as far as possible from the spirit of autogonism in order that the commission may be more efficient and serve to more advantage," Mr. Bean said. Dr. Chester C. Moore advised his fellow members that "the Multnomah Anglers' club is not the state of Oregon," and he further told them that after a thorough and open-minded investigation he had found the present fish and game commission to be doing everything possible in the interests of the sportsmen and for that reason he refused to be a party to any movement which would result in their overthrow.

After Mr. Moulton had ridiculed the work being done in Oregon for the propagation of fish, R. E. Clanton, master fish warden, jumped to his feet and challenged Mr. Moulton or any other person to prove that his best efforts at all times have not been put forward in the interest of trout propagation. He said that Seth Roberts, who had made the recent fish and game investigation for Governor Olcott at a cost to the state of \$3500, had admitted to him that some of the figures in his report relating to the fishing industry were not correct. In spite of the pleas of Representative Bean, Senator Bull, Senator Gill and others for harmony, the club passed a motion instructing its executive board to take the necessary steps which will result in determining the validity and constitutionality of the new fish and game commission.

The Standard Oil filling station at Thirteenth and Burnside streets was held up at 9 P. M. on January 13, by two men. The robbers took \$30 from the cash register and \$100 from F. M. Winniford, who was in charge of the place.

Last Garage Hold-Up Denied.

The Nob Hill pharmacy, Twenty-first and Glisan streets, is the last job which is said to have been committed by the men, and occurred on the night of January 14, at 10:25. The three unmasked highwaymen made their escape in an automobile after robbing the four occupants of the store of about \$25, four gold watches and two diamond rings. Pretending to purchase a package of chewing gum, one of the men held up E. W. Recken, 202 North Twenty-first street, proprietor of the pharmacy, as he was making change at the till. Mr. Recken, Earl Dunlap, who lives at the same address as Recken, Dr. E. M. Senn, 706 Overton street, and Thomas Randies, 656 Glisan street, who were in the store at the time, were lined up and robbed. Randies lost his watch, chain and a pocketbook containing \$5; Recken lost \$25 and a watch; Dunlap lost his watch and a pocketbook containing \$7, and Dr. Senn lost \$12 or \$15, his watch and a diamond ring. The men denied the hold-up of the Fashion garage Thursday night, the detectives say.

ALCOHOL VICTIM BETTER

DUNCAN MCGREGOR GETS 90
DAYS FOR SELLING STEUF.

Wood Spirits and Grape Juice Land
Arthur Bronkin in Hospital
and Then in Jail.

Duncan McGregor, who sold a bottle of liquor containing wood alcohol and grape juice to Arthur Bronkin, 222½ Crosby street, which resulted in Bronkin being taken to the police emergency hospital for treatment Thursday night, was sentenced to 90 days in jail yesterday by Municipal Judge Rosenman.

Bronkin was given 90 days in jail on a charge of drunkenness. McGregor is said to have sold Bronkin the concoction for 50 cents. Bronkin told the hospital attendants that he took five or six drinks.

Bronkin was reported to be much better yesterday and was able to get out of the hospital. He did not think that he would suffer any serious consequences as a result of his wood alcohol drink.

Tom Parker was given a fine of \$100 in municipal court on a charge of violating the prohibition law by having liquor in his possession, and Giano Albanese was fined \$25 on a similar charge.

N. C. Janssen, who was arrested by Police Sergeant Crane in St. Johns, was fined \$20 for violating the prohibition law.

Scotchmen Merry at Concert of Music and Story.
Clan Macleay No. 122 Celebrates Birthday Anniversary of Robert Burns.

SCOTCHMEN resident in this and nearby cities who attended the concert of Scotch music and story, given last night in Masonic temple auditorium, by Clan Macleay No. 122, Order of Scottish Clans, were hailed as brave men when, clad in kilts and other evidences of their nationality, they walked from their homes and faced the cold wind that blew from the northwest. It was a cruel test for bare knees, but a merry-making flinched, or asked to be excused. It was kilt night and kilts were preferred to pants.

The occasion was the observance by Clan Macleay of the 141st anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns, Scotland's national poet, who first saw the light of day, January 25, 1759. The observance of Burns' birth was held last night, as being more convenient. The hall was crowded by an audience consisting of men, women and children and much enthusiasm reigned. Pipe Major McDonald was dressed in flowing tartans and, wearing his army medals, played Scotch music on his bagpipes and short addresses on Scotch topics were made by Chief A. W. Hutchison and Royal Chief A. G. Finley.

Songs were sung in stirring, enjoyable fashion by Mrs. Eloise Hall Cook, Mrs. Lulu Dahl Miller, J. Macmillan Muir, Dr. Stuart McGuire and John Webster. "The latter is a member of the Clan Macleay and dressed in Rob Roy tartan. He sang and the audience heartily sang with him, a new song sung by Harry Lauder, the refrain of which is:

Every laddie loves a lassie,
Whether she be dark or fair;
Every lassie loves a laddie,
Just because the love lies there.

The piano accompaniments were supplied by J. R. Hutchison and violin solos were played by Miss Helen Harper. Scotch dances were danced by the Misses Mathie and Clansman Gray Purvis, in costume.

A dance followed, the dance card calling for 10 dances, with extras.

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HOOVER BOOM SOLE WASHINGTON TOPIC

Political Leaders Show More
Friendly Attitude.

ATTACKS HELP BOOM

Opposition Comes From Pro-Germans, Anti-British and Sinn Fein,
and Is Source of Strength.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 23.—Herbert Hoover's boom for president, precipitated by the New York World on Wednesday continued today to obscure everything else in national politics. The general attitude toward him was more friendly among politicians and leaders, and a very much larger number of the real leaders permitted themselves to be quoted.

Mr. Hoover appeared perceptibly strengthened by the sharp personal attacks made upon him by the pro-Germans, the anti-British and the Sinn Feiners. It is impossible to avoid coupling these three groups in this manner by reason of the fact that they all travel in the same direction and keep much the same company. Their impelling motives may be different, but their methods are so identical that there is no way to separate them here in Washington.

The first attacks made on Mr. Hoover as a candidate came from the sources mentioned, and carried the statement that he was a Britisher and not an American. It was said that "Who's Who," the British publication carried his biography with the statement that he was a member of the liberal party in England. It has not been possible to verify this.

27 Years Spent in England.
It was further said, and it appears to be true, that almost 27 years of Mr. Hoover's life has been spent in England, his principal investments being in British mining companies. This, of course, offers the best argument against him for those who are fond of twisting the lion's tail.

Republicans as well as democrats of the strongly American type seemed to realize today the necessity of fairer treatment for Mr. Hoover, and the most of the interviews given out by public men were friendly. The good and the bad were treated fairly by Mr. Hoover during the war in the matter of price-fixing. Senator Kenyon of Iowa, who was quoted yesterday as suggesting "Read Who's Who in England" as his only comment, was more complimentary today.

McNary Sees No Chance.
Senator Polindexter said, "I would be delighted to see Mr. Hoover nominated by the democrats," while Senator McNary said, "I am not a very good man but has not a look-in for the nomination of either party." There are evidences that a Hoover organization will be under way in a short time, but from the fact that most of the men who are active in his interest are republicans it appears more than likely that they will put him forth as a republican candidate.

It is understood, it is to be a non-partisan movement, but the primary aims of most of the states are so definite that it will be necessary for Mr. Hoover's backers to say in a short time which nomination they seek for him.

Raymond B. Stevens, vice-chairman of the shipping board and a one-term democratic member of congress from New Hampshire, has filed as a Hoover candidate for delegate from New Hampshire to the democratic national convention.

Republicans show no concern over the possible developments of the Hoover candidacy, but democrats are visibly disturbed, the fear apparently being that the rank and file of the party cannot be controlled by the politicians who are opposed to him.
