IRISH PROTESTANTS TO LECTURE—Ulster's side of the Irish question will be discussed from the religious and economic standpoint next Sunday in public lectures by Rev. Maurice Murphy and Lindsay Crawford. The latter is the descendant of an Irish family that has been Protestant for 300 years, and he is considered an authority on the views of Ulster. Mr. Murphy is a Dublin Methodist minister and will tell of the part the Irish Protestants are taking to obtain complete national independence for their country. The lectures will be given in the city auditorium at 8 P. M. under auspices of the Ulster society of Portland. No admission will be charged. A short musical programme will precede the address.

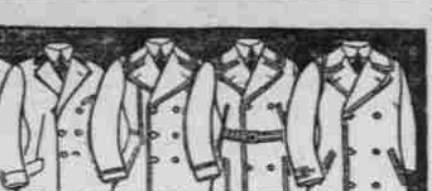
