## HARDWARE MEN GATHER

ANNUAL CONVENTION OPENS AT IMPERIAL HOTEL.

Curtis M. Johnson of Rush City, Minn., Gives Address on Costs and Profits.

Hardware and implement dealers from all parts of the state gathered yesterday for their fourteenth annual convention which got under way at the Imperial hotel to continue until Friday night.

costs and profits, during which he advanced the argument that ignorance of actual costs causes nearly all failures in the hardware business. By aid of a chart he proved to the satisfaction of the dealers that the cost of doing business averages from 17 to 20 per cent. He further maintained that by giving better service dealers can increase values and reduce their expense of doing business. "What profit a man if he gains the whole world and leave a rich widow?" was an epigram he used in asserting that the service a dealer can do for his community is of more value than mere profits and assets. In touching upon the labor situation, he declared that labor must pay its own wage because every time labor advances the wage it must pay it out in increased cost of living.

Mr. Johnson is down on the program for the chief address this afternoon. During the morning session technical subjects will be discussed by implement dealers and manufacturers. The reports of the various committees and election of officers for the ensuing year will take place tomorrow afternoon. President Jameson named a resolutions committee of which G. W. Griffin is chairman, and a legislative committee of which Charles R. Archer is chairman.

**BOARD BALANCE IS SHOWN**  
State Livestock Sanitary Department Report Made.  
SALEM, Or., Jan. 27.—(Special.)—Total expenditures of the Oregon state livestock sanitary board for the period from January 1 to December 31, 1919, were \$21,762.58, which, when deducted from the biennial appropriation of \$46,000, leaves an unexpended balance of \$24,237.42, according to a report filed with Governor Olcott today by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian.

Included among the expenditures were indemnities amounting to \$7188.11 paid to owners of horses and cattle killed by order of the state officials.
