Deaths Since Disease Reappeared Only 8.

WORST IS BELIEVED PAST

State Health Officer Declares Sitnation Is Encouraging-Law Enforcement Is Demanded.

A total of 1212 cases of influenza with eight deaths for the entire period during which the disease has been prevalent, including the city of Portland, was the report made public last night by Dr. David N. Roberg.

state health officer. Portland has 39 reported new cases, but no deaths. The Dailes heads the list with 65 cases, but no deaths. There was one death at Gervais, one at Falls City and one at Pendleton

"Burns, where there are 29 cases, reports the apex reached," said Dr. Roberg, "and I believe the worst is over all along the line. The cases have not been so severe as during the last epidemic and I feel greatly encouraged over the outlook."

Portland to provide sufficient nurses and the plan of interesting all who have had experience or who wish to learn is being resorted to in the com-munities afflicted.

Difficulty was experienced yesterday, it was reported, in getting Portland physicians to comply with the law which requires them to post the quarantine cards. City Health Officer Parrish announced in the afternoon that he would enforce this law to the letter and that, unless there is con pliance with its terms, arrests will be made. He also said that he would distribute cards for quarantine service in drug stores throughout the city : as to make the work as convenient as possible for the doctors.
