ATTACK ON WOMAN CHARGED.—Jess E. Wilson, a truck driver, was arrested at 435 Madison street last night morning by Detective Gordon and Wright charged with having assaulted and beaten Mrs. H. E. Butanke at her home, 924 Grand avenue, Wednesday evening. The man was said to have driven to the place with his truck and to have questioned Mrs. Butanke, asking if she wanted to be moved. After she said no he was said to have attacked her. Residents in the same building heard the scuffle and went to the rescue of Mrs. Butanke and were said to have frightened the man away. Wilson's bail was placed at \$500.

WHITE SLAVE RETRIAL.—Will Be Asked. Immediate retrial of Joe Lombardi, an Italian charged with white slavery, will be sought, according to Morris Goldstein, defense counsel, following his agreement with the jury which heard the case before Federal Judge Wolverton. The jurors reported they would be unable to reach any sort of agreement and were discharged. Lombardi was accused of bringing Mrs. Helen Spence from North Yakima, Wash., to Portland. They made the trip by automobile. It is charged.

DOGS MAY BE ARRESTED.—More strict enforcement of the law classifying dogs as personal property for assessment purposes, may result in owners paying three taxes on canines this year. A copy of the list of owners taking out state licenses at the courthouse has been furnished to the county assessor and pets may be included on many assessment blanks. This year the tax would be 36 cents on a dog valued at \$10, with proportionate charges for dogs of different value. State and city taxes must be secured to obtain necessary licenses.

CHIEF SCOUT IS TO SPEAK.—James E. West, chief scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America, will speak at the Port of Portland visitor next Wednesday, and will be heard in several addresses on that day, his public appearance being at the auditorium at 8 o'clock. Mr. West came west to attend the western round-up of scout executive commissioned leaders and volunteer workers held recently in Berkeley and while on the coast he will deliver a number of addresses on various phases of scout activity.

WOMAN TAKES POISON.—Mrs. Irene Burleson, 37 years of age, was taken to St. Vincent's hospital by the Ambulance Service company yesterday morning after she had taken a quantity of corrosive sublimate at her home, 554 East Madison street, about 8 o'clock. She was reported to have a badly burned stomach, but it was believed that she would recover. The authorities had been unable to learn yesterday whether the poison was taken by accident or design.

ANNAPOLIS TESTS SET.—Examinations will be held at 9 o'clock February 7 in the High School of Commerce for applicants desiring naval academy appointments. Representative McArthur has the privilege of recommending the eight men who make the highest grades, who possess the necessary qualifications and who live in Multnomah county. The two finally selected will be required to go to Annapolis for physical tests. The preliminary examination to be given here through the city superintendent's office will include English, geography, history, arithmetic, algebra and geometry. Thus far only five or six boys have notified Superintendent Groat of their intention of trying for places.

BRIDGES REPORTED SAFE BUT NEED REPAIRS.—Though the need of extensive repairs is seen, there is nothing serious in the condition of the Morrison and Burnside bridges, according to a report of C. B. McCullough, state bridge engineer, nearing completion, but which has not yet been presented to the county commissioners. No prophecy is made as to the probable life of either bridge. Closing of the Morrison bridge for at least 60 days so that the entire deck could be rebuilt is recommended. The investigation of the Burnside bridge is not yet completed and may take several months more.

FOREST RECEIPTS GAIN.—Forest receipts for the national reserves of the northwest district in the past six months have exceeded by \$14,522.40 those of the corresponding period of the previous year, according to a summary just now completed. The Portland headquarters has handled \$258,968.82, the greater part of this accruing from timber sales and water power charges. Whitman forest has the heaviest sales, totaling \$44,822 in the six months. Tongass in Alaska ranked second, and Greater in Oregon next with \$27,196. Fire, grazing and timber trespass charges netted \$7,046.66.

DRY CELEBRATION TONIGHT.—The First Methodist church will hold its prohibition jubilation celebration tonight at 7:45 by having two timely addresses on the national victory for the dries. One will be given by Bishop Matt S. Hughes on "The Hundred Years' Struggle for Prohibition." The other will be by Miss Margaret Garrison, who recently won the national prohibition oratorical contest at Des Moines. She will deliver the prize-winning oration on "The New Reconstruction."

CIVIC LEAGUE TO HEAR PROFESSOR MCKINLEY.—Professor Charles McKinley, instructor in politics at Reed college, will speak on "The Speech Significance of the Work Done at the Special Session of the Legislature" at the regular weekly luncheon of the Oregon Civic League tomorrow at 12 o'clock at the Hotel Benson. 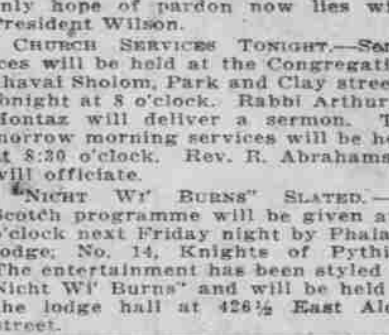

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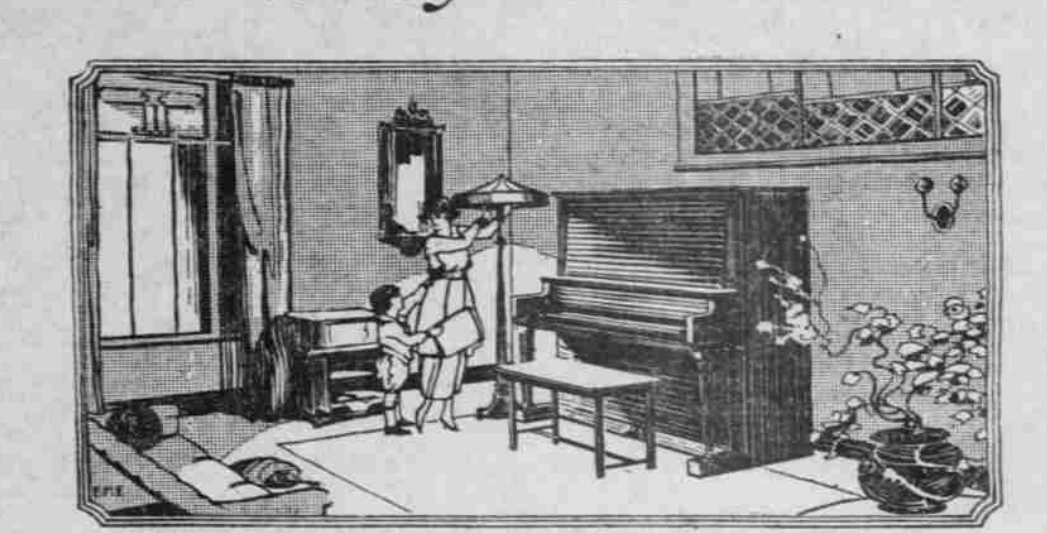
