

STOCKMEN INDORSE PACKING REGULATIONS

Federal Power Big Issue at National Convention.

ANTI-TRUST LAW BACKED

Resolutions Urging Prompt Return of Railroads and Early Treaty Ratification Adopted.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 29.—Government regulation of the packing industry, regarded as the "paramount issue" at the annual convention of the American National Livestock association here, was indorsed in a resolution adopted unanimously at the closing session this afternoon.

An open clash over the measure on the convention floor, which has been threatening throughout the meeting and which seemed certain with the introduction, shortly before noon recess, of majority and minority reports from the resolutions committee on the subject, was averted by the appointment, at the suggestion of former Governor A. B. Ammons of Colorado, of a conference committee.

Regulatory Laws Asked.
It was reported of this committee, submitted at the afternoon session, that was adopted by the convention without a dissenting vote. The resolution as adopted avoids specific reference to the livestock commission bill now pending in the house agri-

culture committee, asks for regulatory laws "so specifically and plainly expressed as to prevent misunderstanding or the exercise of any arbitrary power" and recommends "that the supervision of such market agencies provided for by the proposed legislation be made a matter of law, such as to occasion the least possible disturbance or interference with existing business conditions."

The majority report asked simply for the regulatory legislation, without the qualifying clause and the minority report declared against "grant by congress of any arbitrary or discretionary power to bureaus or officials."

Kendrick's Effort Indorsed.
Efforts of John B. Kendrick, United States senator, as president of the association and of the association's market committee toward the investigation and regulation of the packing industry were indorsed by the association, both through the unanimous adoption of a resolution to that effect and Senator Kendrick's re-election as president of the association by a unanimous vote. Later he announced the reappointment, with one exception, of the present market committee, with H. A. Jastro of Bakersfield, Cal., as chairman and E. L. Burke of Omaha as vice-chairman.

At the afternoon session approximately \$15,000 was raised for expenses of the association, through donations from individual members and from state associations. This amount does not include the Texas donation, which last year amounted to \$4000 from the state association and as much more from individual members.

Early Ratification Asked.
Other resolutions adopted at the forenoon session today asked for immediate ratification of the peace treaty, "safeguarding American interests to the fullest extent with all the reservations," deemed necessary by

the senate, or else passage of a declaration by congress of the ending of the war; indorsed the principle of universal training for the youth of the nation, and demanded the prompt return of the railroads to private control with the restoration of the full powers of the interstate commerce commission.

Others commended the attorney-general for his settlement of the packers' litigation, indorsed the policy of deporting radical aliens; asked the barring of aliens from public lands and recommended placing the public domain under the supervision of the department of agriculture.

MILL EMPLOYEES ARE HURT

Three Are Victims of Accidents Near Cottage Grove.

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Jan. 29.—(Special.)—W. Simmons, who recently arrived here from Idaho, sustained a double fracture of the leg Wednesday when he became entangled with a sprocket wheel of the sawdust conveyor at the Western Lumber & Export company's mill.

J. G. Hanna sustained a badly bruised hand Tuesday at the same mill when his hand was caught between two timbers.

W. Little sustained several fractured ribs at the Bohemia Lumber company's mill when struck by a board.

National Guest Received.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Dr. Juan Antonio Buerro, Uruguayan minister of foreign affairs, who is returning home from Paris, where he served as peace delegate, arrived here today as the guest of the nation. He was welcomed by Secretary Lansing and other officials.

HARRY S. NEW SENTENCED

MURDERER'S MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL IS DENIED.

Slayer of Los Angeles Girl to Serve, Possibly for Life, in San Quentin Penitentiary.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 29.—Harry S. New, recently convicted here of murder in the second degree for shooting Miss Freda Lesser, was denied a new trial after extended hearing on the motion today. He was immediately sentenced to serve not less than ten years, with a maximum of life imprisonment, at San Quentin.

The New case attracted much notice here because of the peculiar circumstances of the shooting, and also because of New's claim that he was a natural son of Senator Harry S. New of Indiana.

New drove to the police station here on the morning of July 5, last, bringing the body of Miss Lesser in a small automobile. She had been shot through the head. New signed two confessions subsequently, admitting that he killed her, and claiming he did so because she refused to marry him, although she was to become the mother of his child.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Jan. 29.—(Special.)—The twelfth annual district convention of the Rebekah lodge of District 16 was held at McCoy, Ore., last Saturday. Mrs. Ella Kelly of Newberg was acting chairman.

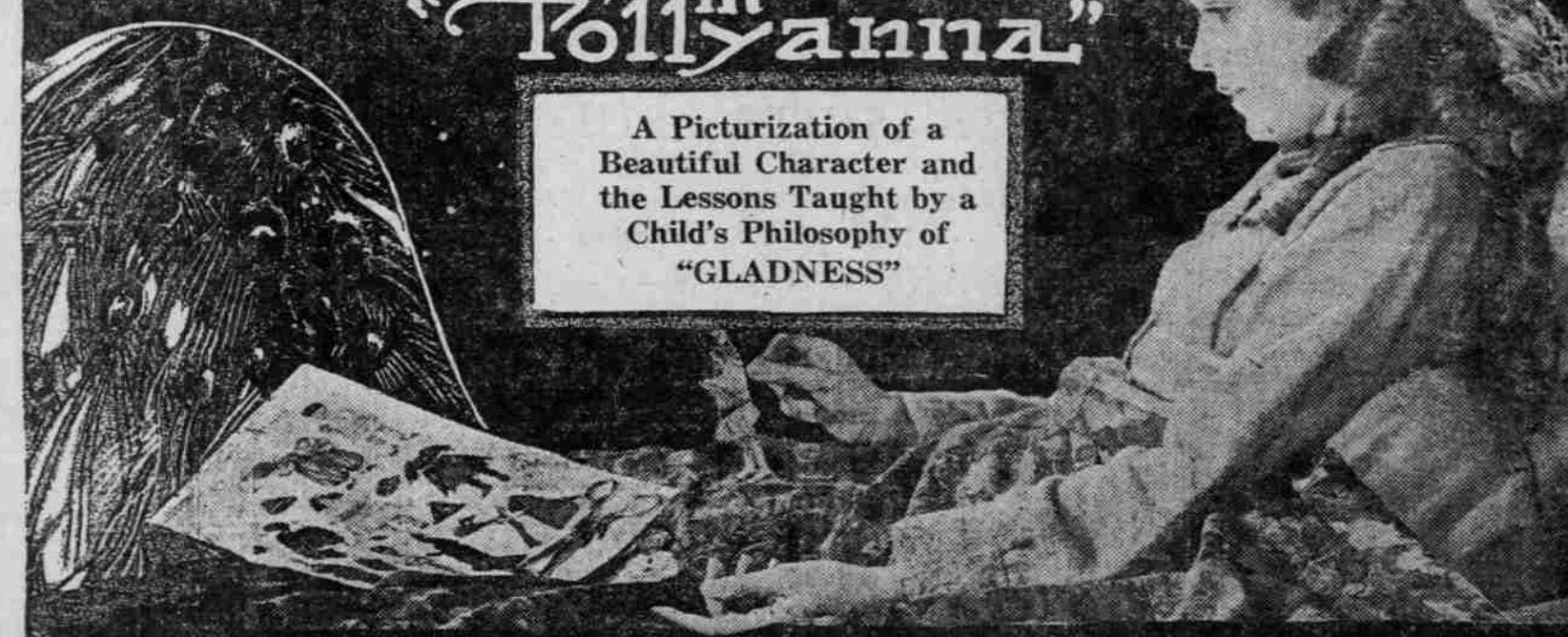
