Francisco: Governor, from San Pedro, via San Francisco. Departed—Governor, for Vancouver, B. C. Admiral Sweeney for San Diego, via San Francisco. City of Seattle, for southeastern Alaska. Crown of Canada, for Liverpool, via San Francisco and Halifax.

OOOS BAY, Or., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The steamer Admiral Goodrich will not get away for the south before Wednesday, owing to the loading of 98 head of cattle being shipped to Eureka. The Goodrich will arrive at San Diego on Wednesday.

The steamer Yellowstone, with a lumber cargo from the North Bend Mill & Lumber company plant, sailed this morning for San Francisco from Portland.

The steamer C. A. Smith is loading with 1,500,000 feet of lumber and will sail for San Francisco on Wednesday.

The months of December and January were not profitable for local longshoremen, owing to the small number of vessels arriving from the coast.

GRAYS HARBOR, Wash., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The steamer Admiral Goodrich is not expected to arrive at San Francisco until today and is loading at the Gray Harbor wharves.

The steamer Chehalis cleared at noon for San Francisco from the American wharf.

The steamer Tahoe cleared at noon for San Pedro for the Donovon mill, Aberdeen.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The schooner Minora cleared at 10 o'clock for Westport.

The schooner Captain A. F. Lucas arrived at 2:30 this afternoon from California bringing a cargo of fuel oil for the steamer Yellowstone.

The motor schooner Admiral Mayo arrived at 10 o'clock from Westport and will sail at 7 tomorrow morning for Astoria.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—After operating from May 1917, and making one voyage to India, the steamship Hyades is to return to the Pacific coast.

The Hyades is due in this port February 25 with a cargo of approximately 7000 tons of goods.

NORTH BEND COUNCIL TO CALL SPECIAL ELECTION.

Plan Would Bond City to Buy 750 Acres of Tide Land for Industrial Uses.

NORTH BEND, Or., Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The movement recently launched here to bond the city for \$400,000 to purchase and improve 750 acres of tide land at the entrance of Coos Bay for industrial purposes received a strong impetus at a meeting of the city council last night.

Following the presentation of the petitions and the taking of a vote, a special election which it is planned will be held at the earliest date permitted by law.

The project is tentatively planned to consist of a channel 600 feet wide, 25 feet deep and one and a half miles long from the harbor channel south to the mouth of the Coos Bay.

Commission Submits Report Giving Listing of Achievement in Providing Terminals.

The annual report to the mayor of the commission of public docks, approved at yesterday's meeting and submitted to the city council at the meeting last night by City Engineer Shulman.

The report concludes with a complete statement of all the facilities of the Port of Portland. Beginning with the organization of the dock commission in 1910, a complete history of its achievements is given, including the various bond issues authorized by the voters for harbor development, which have reached an aggregate of \$10,500,000.

Each of the four municipal terminals is described in detail, and particular attention is given to the expansion program which is being carried out at the present time.
