

MOTOR CAR DEALERS PLAN FOR NEW ROW

Fifteenth to Twentieth on Washington Favored.

ZONING LAW FAVORS, CLAIM

Meeting to Discuss Proposal to Be Held Tomorrow in City Hall by Association.

Plans for a new and permanent automobile row on upper Washington street will be discussed at a meeting of representatives of the Portland Motor Car Dealer Association and property owners on Washington street between Fifteenth and Twentieth streets, tomorrow at 2 P. M. in the offices of the city planning commission, room 424 city hall.

The city planning commission, it is announced, is ready to recommend the elimination of the necessity of special permits and hearings before the city council when new automobile locations and garages are desired in this particular vicinity, providing a substantial majority of property owners in the district are willing to consent.

C. L. Boss, George W. Deane and Fred W. Vogler, who represent the automobile dealers seeking to have the Washington street district dedicated to future automobile business, have told members of the planning commission that at least one large automobile concern is ready to construct a building in this district costing in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

Such an arrangement, if favorable to the adjoining owners, it is not at all certain that the next concern desiring to locate there can obtain this consent, said Charles H. Cheney, consultant to the commission, discussing the proposed plan.

The proposed zoning ordinance gives the property owners on Washington street a chance they have never had before to get together with the motor dealers and remove the necessity of appealing to the council for new permits for alterations.

Dealers Grasp Proposals. The motor dealers have been quick to grasp this and have assured property owners that they stand ready to invest and improve immediately to a large extent if such an understanding can be obtained.

If a substantial majority of property owners favor the class designation for property on Washington street, the planning commission will include the recommendation in the proposed zoning act which is now before the city council for consideration.

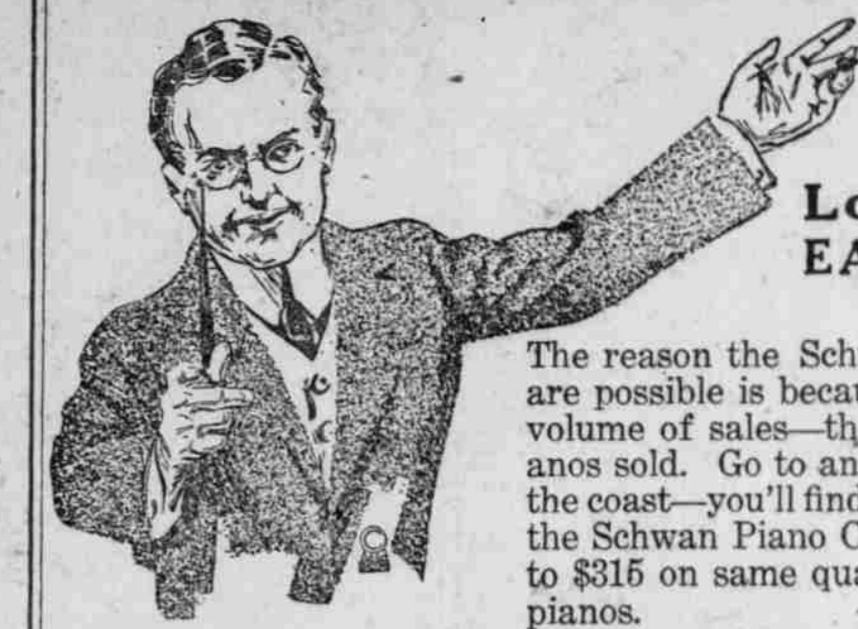
