KIDNAPER GETS TWO YEARS.—Two years in the penitentiary was the sentence given J. C. Alton by Circuit Judge Bingham yesterday, following his conviction last week for the kidnaping of 7-year-old Ruth Johnson. Alton had enticed the girl away from her home with a bribe of ice cream and was found by the girl's father in a deserted store building. He had not harmed the child. Hugo Turner, convicted last week of the theft of nine watches from a Third street jeweler, was sentenced to two years in the state prison by Judge Morrow yesterday. He is a Swiss and deportation action may be taken yet.

CAR RIDE CAUSES ARREST.—A round trip taken on an Alberta owl street car early yesterday morning resulted in A. G. Heimsway, 31, and Louis Iligby, 18, being arrested by the police for investigation. They were released later by Captain of Detectives Circle. The two boys had planned to leave for Newburg this morning on a 10 o'clock train to go to work. They were late the preceding night and they hit upon the idea of taking a round trip on the owl street car, than paying for a room at a hotel. They had previously been working for the Peninsula lumber company.

DUMPING GARBAGE FORBIDDEN.—Complaint made by Commissioner Bigelow, acting mayor, that the city dump, on East Twelfth street, between Hawthorne avenue and Belknap, is being used by people for dumping garbage, cans and various other refuse, resulted in Acting Chief of Police Clark issuing an order yesterday that officers on that beat watch the dump closely. The acting chief ordered that anyone caught dumping garbage there be arrested.

POLICE CHIEF OUT AGAIN.—Chief of Police Jenkins was the hottest man in town yesterday when Quarantine Officer Sipple released the chief from a 21 days' sentence imposed by the city health bureau which he was given for the head of the Portland police bureau had contracted smallpox. Chief Jenkins looked fit and fine when released and announced that he would appear at his office in the police station early this morning for duty.

MR. PLAGEMANN BETTER.—John P. Plagemann, manager of H. Liebes & Co., who has been confined to his home at 835 Marcia street, with illness for several days, was reported yesterday to be much improved. It is anticipated that he will be able to be out again in a week now. It was at first feared that Mr. Plagemann had been suffering from sleeping sickness but physicians now say this is not the case.

BURCHER ACCUSED OF DRUNKENNESS.—L. S. Hobson, butcher, Bechtel avenue and Powell valley, was arrested yesterday afternoon by C. Wiles, motorcycle officer, on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated. According to the officer Hobson was zig-zagging down the street at the rate of 20 miles an hour when arrested. His bail was placed at \$200.

LETTER CAPTIVE ARREST.—Alfred Verhaughe, who is said to have written a threatening letter to Bertina Goossens, was held to answer to the grand jury yesterday by Municipal Judge Roseman on a charge of threatening to commit a felony. His bail was placed at \$500. At the time of his arrest by Detective Gordon and Wright, Verhaughe is said to have had a revolver on his person.

MOTORMAN IS ARRESTED.—H. Toedelemer, street car motorman, was arrested yesterday by Detectives Morak and Howell on a warrant charging him with the larceny of \$150. His bail was placed at \$500 and he will have a hearing in the municipal court today. Mrs. Katherine Tyrell dropped a purse containing \$150 in the street car and Toedelemer is said to have picked it up.

DAMAGES ASKED FOR INJURIES.—Personal injury suits were filed in the circuit court yesterday by Geary C. Price against the Portland Trackless Car company for \$2500 and Maude E. Kaufman against E. Rivell for \$5000. Injuries in both cases were the result of automobile accidents, the first occurring in February, 1915, the latter in November, 1919.

FORGOT SUSPECT HELD.—Ross Cummings was held to answer to the grand jury on a charge of forgery yesterday by Judge Roseman following his arrest by Sergeant Sherwood and Patrolmen Russell, Ferry and O. E. Schupp. His bail was placed at \$500. Cummings is said to have found a check for \$37 and to have indorsed and cashed it.

EXTRADITION TO BE FORGOTTEN.—Shirley Page, clerk 23 years of age, who was arrested by Detectives Gordon and Wright following a telegram from Spokane, Wash., charging him with grand larceny, will fight extradition. Page is said to have purchased a guitar on the installment plan and to have left the state without completing his payments.

MAYOR INSISTS ON HAVING HOSPITAL

City Must Meet Epidemics Some Way, Says Executive.

LOAN PLAN IS WEIGHED

City Attorney Instructed to Determine Whether Certificates May Be Issued.

"In face of the influenza epidemic of last year, which claimed more than 1200 lives in Portland, and in face of two epidemics now prevalent in Portland, the city must provide immediately an adequate contagious hospital. If money in the general fund is not available, some other means must be provided to raise necessary funds. To throw up our hands at this time is criminal."

Such was the statement of Mayor Baker yesterday when seen at his home, where he is recovering from an attack of quinsy. The mayor said that the first thing he planned to do Monday, when he expects to return to his office, is to work out some plan whereby the city can obtain the money necessary to construct a contagious hospital.

Legal Question Raised.
 Through Hal M. White, his secretary, the mayor requested City Attorney LaRoche to determine if there was some way in which the city could issue certificates of indebtedness and thereby obtain necessary funds for the hospital. Should the city attorney find that the city cannot legally pursue this method, the mayor has decided to request certain business men in the city either to lend the city money or to donate money with which to pay for the cost of the hospital.

"Conservation of human life is one of the most important duties reposed in city officials. To continue using makeshift facilities for handling contagious diseases would be criminal, to say the least. I am opposed to any plan of spending money for temporary arrangements. Too much money has been spent in that manner now."

Same Work Is Done.
 Mayor Baker said that when arrangements were made for the use of the Kelly Butte jail, the county commissioners, who have charge of the buildings were told that within 60 days the city would have an adequate contagious hospital and the jail would be turned back to the county.

At that time, he said, the council was unanimous in the decision to build the hospital and the department of public works was given the duty of excavating the basement and preparing the plans. A roadway was constructed, he said, and all indications pointed to progress.

"Fortunately we utilized Kelly Butte jail for smallpox patients," said the mayor, "but it made the hospital and the jail in South Portland available for influenza patients. But a jail is not a fit place for sick people, and when the arrangements were made some months ago, it was the distinct understanding that the arrangement was temporary only."

ARREST FOLLOWS FIGHT
Two Men Caught by Police May Be Members of Robber Gang.
 Charles Cummings and J. S. Cummings, believed by the police to be belonging to a gang of thieves now operating in the city and who were captured early yesterday morning when they were alleged to have been in the act of carrying a large quantity of shoes from a storehouse belonging to Max E. Clary, 233 Clay street, were held to answer to the grand jury yesterday. Their bail was placed at \$500.

The two men were arrested by Motorcycle Officers Nolan and Wiles after a pursuit in which six shots were fired by the policemen. When finally overtaken J. S. Cummings and Officer Wiles engaged in a fight which resulted in the officer losing a tooth and the prisoner being badly battered about the face. Charles Cummings submitted to arrest without a struggle after being overtaken.
