LIBRARY ASSISTANTS RETURN.—New assistants in the library, returned from war work, are Miss Dorothea L. Smith, from Chico, Cal., who has come to become librarian of the University of California, and is a graduate of Stanford university and of the River-side, Cal., library school. She has had several years' experience in a county library work in California and during the war served as a filing clerk in Washington and as assistant in the war library association's headquarters in Paris. Miss Mary C. Hen-thorne, the other assistant, recently was reappointed to service in the Portland library. She was formerly librarian in the Portland library and was granted a leave of absence in October, 1917, to work in training camps. She is now first assistant in the order department.

HOME-MAKING COURSES ANNOUNCED.—Three new courses for adults open this week at the girls' polytechnic school, part of a series of special home-making studies for women. The first is six lessons in housewifery to be given Wednesday and Friday from February 18 to March 5. Mrs. C. W. Battersby will direct this class. Miss Marie Williams is to have six lessons in spring cookery on Tuesdays and Thursdays until March 4. A course of eight lessons in meat and fish cookery, with special emphasis on the less expensive cuts and cooking of poultry and rabbits will be given by Miss Laura Riley. A fee of 50 cents is charged for each of the classes, which are to be held from 2 to 3:30 P. M. on the specified days.

MOONSHINE OPERATOR STRANGENESS.—Nine months in the county jail with a fine of \$500 is the penalty Harry Travers must pay for operating a still in the basement of the home of A. V. Murphy, in whose dwelling the Claremont tavern robbers had taken refuge. A bottle of moonshine was found in the room in which they were arrested and all three holdovers were said to have been under the influence of liquor at the time. Travers, in confessing, said he rented the basement from Murphy, but the latter maintains he knew nothing about illicit operations there. Murphy will be tried later.

ALLIES RESUMES OLD JOB.—Harry G. Allen, who for the past six months as president of the Oregon State Elks' association and associate director of the war loan organization for Oregon, has been in active charge of the sale of government securities in this state, has returned to the J. K. Gill company, as manager of the furniture department. Mr. Allen gained an exceptional record in his government work because of his energy and aggressiveness. Oregon raised the highest quota percentage of the savings for 1919 among western states.

Lieutenant Dawson is the author of "Carry On," one of the finest of war books. Colonel John Leader will introduce Lieutenant Dawson. A dinner will be given for him at the University club, before the lecture, when the speakers will be held for 12 to include those who have worked to bring Mr. Dawson here.

PRINEVILLE BOY RELEASED.—Gordon Warner, a boy who was taken in custody by federal officers along with eight Prineville people involved in bootlegging charges, was released yesterday by Federal Judge J. C. O'Connell. The youth was found to have no connection with the alleged illicit activities of his father and brother. The case was handled by Assistant U. S. Attorney Reames, who also brought up the case of Charles China, a Chinese, who was fined \$100 for selling narcotics.

PIER TALKS ON LINCOLN.—City Commissioner Pier gave an address on "Abraham Lincoln" at yesterday's meeting of the Kiwanis club at the Benson hotel, telling of the early life of the martyred president and his struggles to obtain an education. Samuel Lancaster, state chairman of the Armenian relief drive, introduced Mrs. O. F. Lamson of Seattle, who told of Armenia and of the condition of the people there. A committee was appointed by President Wiggins to solicit funds for the Armenians. Wiggins J. MacKenzie gave of his attendance at the charter presentation banquet of the Victoria, B. C. Kiwanis Club. Portland was the only city in the United States sending a delegate to this meeting. Victorians promised to attend in a body the international Kiwanis convention in Portland June 15 to 18.

PIGIRIN COMMITTEE NAMED.—At the request of officials of the Sulgrave Institution in New York City, Mayor Oesterly yesterday appointed a committee to represent Portland in preparing and carrying out an adequate programme for the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers and of the first meeting of a legislative assembly on American soil. The committee includes Winthrop Hammond, chairman; Eugene McCann, Thomas L. Elliot, Robert Treat Platt, Frank M. Warren, William L. Brewster, William D. Wheelwright, John S. Bradley, Edmund L. Devereux, E. D. Kingsley and William Ladd.

Ramsey, 456 East Oak street, died at St. Vincent's hospital Monday night as the result of an automobile accident Sunday morning in which the automobile in which he was riding turned turtle on the Oswego road near 23rd Rock, pinning him beneath and dislocating his neck. Mr. Ramsey underwent an operation at the hospital Monday. The body was buried at the Evergreen cemetery.

PUR SALESMEN ARRESTED.—Robert Brenner and Paul Bonivodon, salesmen, who claim to be representing the Favorite Knitting company of Milwaukee, were arrested yesterday afternoon by Detectives Halper and Phillips at a hotel at Broadway and Stark street and are being held for investigation. The two men are said to have been offering valuable furs and other goods at so low a price that the officers became suspicious of them. The knitting company is being communicated with.

EX-CAPTAIN HAS NEW JOB.—J. D. Goodrich, formerly a captain in the United States army and recently mustered out of the service at Camp Lewis, has opened an office for an Alaskan engineering commission, constructing the government railroad for the department of the interior. He is here as general purchasing agent, and his office is located in room 202 of the customs house building. Later he will have permanent offices in the new postoffice.

BOY ARRESTED ON FORGERY CHARGE.—William Daniel Calkins, 16 years of age, was arrested on a charge of forgery yesterday afternoon at 3515 Forty-ninth street southeast by inspectors Wright and Gordon. Charges against Calkins were preferred by L. Pohl proprietor of a grocery store at Broadway and Clay street. According to the inspectors the boy confessed to passing 12 bad checks. He was turned over to the juvenile court.

K. Hamilton in a suit for \$2000 damages filed in the circuit court yesterday against J. G. Miller and H. J. Tracey of the Miller & Tracey undertaking parlors. Mrs. Hamilton asserts that the funeral of her mother, Mrs. Sarah Doughton, on January 4, 1920, was held at the undertaking chapel and that the body was shipped to the state of Washington for interment. When the box was opened at the grave, Mrs. Hamilton asserts she was chagrined and humiliated to find an inferior casket had been substituted.

PROSSER, Wash., Feb. 17.—(Special.)—At least three new business blocks will be under way within the next three weeks if the bright weather which Prosser has been experiencing the last week keeps up and which has given impetus to the building operations in the downtown district.
