SCOUTS TO COLLECT PAPER.—More than 1000 husky young Boy Scouts have promised to take part in the one-day paper drive for the Red Cross shop next month. All that is asked of Portland people is that they collect their old magazines and newspapers into bundles, tying them up and then placing them on front porches during the morning. Scouts will collect the bundles, hauling them to the nearest fire station, whence they will be hauled away by the paper companies who will pay a flat price per pound to the American Red Cross shop. The society will use the funds to take care of its home service work. Those with automobiles are asked to take their bundles of papers and magazines to the fire houses during the week.

WAKEFIELD ESTATE \$50,000.—An estate valued at \$50,000 was left by the late Robert Wakefield, who died in Portland February 12, according to the petition for probate of will filed in the circuit court yesterday by Charles McDonald, who was later appointed executor. The estate consists of \$25,000 in personal and the remainder in real property. Mrs. Della Wakefield, the widow, is the sole heir in a will drawn August 22, 1912, which gives her a life interest in all the property. At her death it is provided that the estate shall be distributed equitably among the four children, Frank Wakefield, William Wakefield and Nellie V. Borker of Portland and Alice W. Borker of Oswego.

SMILE DRAWS TIME IN JAIL.—When H. Durschmidt, 15, appeared in municipal court yesterday to answer to a charge of speeding 40 miles an hour down Hawthorne avenue he refused to take the offense seriously and continued smiling while being questioned by the court. Judge Rossman decided, as he expressed it, "that the boy needed something to wipe the smile off his face" and he gave a \$25 fine and 16 hours in jail. Patrolman Strain, who made the arrest, testified that he had to drive 60 miles an hour to overtake Durschmidt.

WRECK HEARING TODAY.—C. E. Cobb, clerk, arrested yesterday morning after he is said to have had a collision with a repair car of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company at East Thirty-fifth and Belmont streets, will have a hearing in the municipal court today on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated. When the case came up for hearing yesterday it was set over by the judge to give Cobb a chance to arrange his defense. The man was arrested by Patrolman Wood.

BUSINESS SPLITS HOME

H. F. CROMWELL COMPLAINS OF WIFE'S DATES WITH MEN.

Loss of Love Said to Have Resulted After Woman's Entry Into Barber Trade.

When Howard P. Cromwell, ex-preacher and street-car conductor, agreed to the suggestion of his wife that they take up the profession of barbering as the best way in which to support their family of five children he did not hear the divorce court snicker. This decision was the indirect cause of all future trouble.

The big question before Judge McCourt yesterday was whether or not the divorce court should uphold an injunction against picketing of local jewelry establishments.

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PICKET DECISION NEAR

Judge McCourt to Pass on Issue Tomorrow, He Announces.

The decision reached by Presiding Circuit Judge McCourt in the Greenfield picketing case, argument in which consumed three days, will be announced tomorrow morning, said the jurist yesterday. It is a case similar to the one now before the state supreme court in which the central labor council is appealing from a majority decision of Circuit Judges Kavanaugh and Stapleton upholding an injunction against picketing of local jewelry establishments.

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ROBBER TO BE DEPORTED

Russian Admits Theft, Gets 10 Years, but Will Be Sent Back.

Sam Paut admitted to Presiding Circuit Judge McCourt that he had been a "bad egg" even in far-off Russia, saying that his arrival in America in 1910 followed his escape from Siberia, where he had been taken for complicity in bomb plots in Petrograd, then St. Petersburg. Then he pleaded guilty to robbing the home of Mike Elias on Lake street December 20.

Ten years in the state penitentiary was the sentence pronounced by Judge McCourt, but will not be served, as Immigration Commissioner Bonham was notified deportation machinery was set in motion. Paut is 45, of Russian birth. He said two other men, who escaped, were his companions in the robbery to which he pleaded.
