UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—The Stanford quintet scored another victory tonight over the Oregon five, winning by a score of 29 to 18. The game was much closer than last night's contest, and the Oregon five showed up much better. Bill Steers, of football fame, played on the varsity five for the first time this season.

Tonight's game was played before a small group of spectators, composed of substitutes, coaches and officials, as the contest last night was due to the influenza ban on university activities. Stanford, with two more coast conference games to be played this week-end with Oregon Agricultural college, has the coast championship well in sight, having lost only one game this season. Oregon has but two more games in the conference to play, and is out of the running for the championship.

Tonight's game was much faster and less rough than last night's contest. Of eight fouls called on the Stanford team, Durmo converted six for Oregon.

Coach Shy Huntington again used a shifted lineup in an endeavor to stop the visitors, Jacobberger being used for the first time this season at center and Durmo at guard. McCready played a full game at forward.

COUGARS DEFEAT CALIFORNIA

Score 31 to 27 in Battle of Thrills
and Narrow Squeaks.

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, Wash., Feb. 25.—(Special.)—The fighting Cougars outgamed the California Bears tonight in the last ten minutes of the most thrilling basketball contest ever witnessed here, and snatched victory out of the fire by the score, 31 to 27.

The first period ended after 20 minutes of near-footbal, with the south-erners leading by one point margin, 14 to 13, and they increased their lead by six points immediately after the beginning of the final stanza, but the Cougars held a brief consultation, the result of which was a tie score ten minutes before the final shot. Pink Melvor was ousted at this juncture, having four personal fouls chalked up against him. Gilles, fullback on the year's eleven, replacing him. Gilles immediately responded to the pleadings of the packed galleries with a basket from a difficult angle. Chick Rocky came through with another, and the victory was Washington State's.

The contest was a battle royal, but nevertheless was cleanly played throughout. Both teams were evenly matched, barring the Bear's advantage in weight and size, the Bohler men excelling in team play and floor working. Rocky again led his teammates in scoring from scrimmage, and Bobbie Moss featured with seven out of eight tries from the foul mark. Again Eggleston was the luminary for the Bears, shooting three baskets from mid-court. The latter is the best forward seen on the local court this season. The Bears leave tomorrow for Seattle to meet the university in two games on Friday and Saturday.
