

HOSPITAL BUILDING WORK TO BE RUSHED

County Will Underwrite City
Up to \$25,000.

BIGELOW OPPOSES PLAN

Contagion Structure at Kelly Butte
to Be Semi-Permanent—Co-op-
eration With School Is Aim.

Assurance of financial assistance from the county commission, given at a joint meeting of the city and county commissions yesterday, resulted in an order to begin immediately on the construction of a hospital building on the Kelly Butte site. Under present plans the building, equipped to handle 50 patients, will be completed for use in less than six months.

County Commissioner Bigelow and Mack agreed to underwrite the city for any amount found to be necessary, not exceeding \$25,000 and, although Commissioner Hoyt, chairman of the board, said that he believed the city should shift for itself, finally agreed to join his colleagues in giving financial assistance if the city officials make a showing that such aid was essential to the completion of the hospital.

Although the proposed hospital will be in the nature of a temporary building, it will be so built and equipped as to give comfortable care to the sick. It is planned to utilize it as a contagion hospital for the next two or three years, after which time, it is expected that the county will have completed a contagion unit in connection with the county hospital adjacent to the University of Oregon medical school.

Members of the county commission were unanimous in the promise that the county would construct and maintain a contagion hospital in connection with the county hospital, but no promise would be given that such a unit could be completed in less than two years.

The plan to proceed with construction of the contagion hospital at Kelly Butte is by the consent of all members of the city commission except Commissioner Bigelow, who stubbornly stood for a makeshift building costing \$20,000 or \$25,000 in which to house the sick.

Dr. K. A. J. MacKenzie, dean of the University of Oregon medical college, told the city and county officials of the urgent necessity of a contagion hospital immediately. He favored the plan of ultimately placing the contagion hospital adjacent to the medical college, saying that proper isolation of contagious diseases can safely be placed in a building on the college campus.

After the members of the county commission agreed to underwrite the city to the extent of \$25,000 for the construction of a contagion hospital, the city council returned to the city hall where in a short session it was decided to proceed with all possible rapidity in the construction of the hospital.

Should Commissioner Bigelow continue his attitude in refusing to vote for an appropriation for the building of the hospital, it will be 30 days before money is available, and unless arrangements can be made with building supply dealers, it will be impossible to make much progress in the construction work during that period.

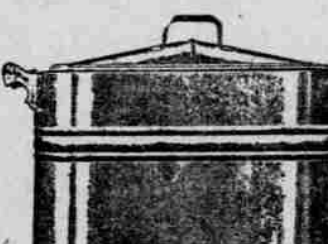

NEW LABOR PARTY SCORED

SENATOR PIERCE SAYS BODY
IS SINGLE TAX SOCIETY.

Realtors Protest Proposed Zoning
Ordinance—Delegates to Convention Named.

That the new land and labor league recently formed at Salem is a single tax organization in disguise and that the main aim of the new league is to put over the single tax law in Oregon, was the declaration of State Senator Walter M. Pierce of Union county, in speaking before the Portland Realty board at its regular weekly luncheon and meeting at the Benson hotel yesterday. Senator Pierce is president of the State Taxpayers' league and is in the city to take charge of a meeting of the league scheduled to open this morning at 10 o'clock in the Imperial hotel.

Mr. Pierce is known as the father of the 6 per cent limitation in Oregon, having been first president of the State Taxpayers' league and instrumental in the fight to carry the law through the legislature and later have it placed before the people, where it was passed and became a constitutional amendment. In his talk before the realty board yesterday he briefly discussed the subject of taxation.

The matter of the city zoning ordinance, which comes up for final action Wednesday morning before the city commission, was further discussed and it was voted that the entire membership of the Portland Realty board be on hand at that time to protest against the passage of the ordinance as it is drawn. The determination was expressed by half a dozen speakers to bring the measure to a referendum of the people in case it is passed next Wednesday without alterations.

It was voted to send the president of the board, P. W. German, and the secretary, Fred O. Brockman, to the national convention of realty boards in Kansas City in June, and it was further voted to hold a speaking competition to select a third delegate to attend the convention and to represent the board and the city of Portland on the programme. Details of the five-minute speaking contest are to be worked out by a committee.
